AUCTION OF MEN IS GOING BETTER

Volunteer Offering of Human Beings on the Auction Block is Novel.

BOSTON, Sept. 12.—The collapse of Edward Dixon of Philadelphia, apparently from malnutrition, just after his services had been sold to the highest bidder, brought the second day of the auction block for unemployed men on the Common to a close after 12 men had been promised work.

Dixon, a World War veteran, said one meal a day and sometimes not that, had been his portion.

Bidders were more plentiful Friday than Thursday and many pledges of food and clothing for men in addition to payment of wages were forthcoming. Women acted as auctioneers and put the men, stripped to the waist, through exercises to show their capability.

\$25 Weekly and Found. The party of unemployed went from their west and headquarters to the Common through the noon day crowds in the business district, gathering a considerable audience as they went. The first three men to be put up found jobs among the bidders, two getting two weeks' work with board, clothing and pay at the rate of \$25 a week from a theatrical producer and another \$25 a month with food, clothing and lodging for underscribed labor.

Many persons who took no part in the bidding contributed toward feeding the workless men.

Canadian Veteran Taken. A fourth man, Angelo Ricci, who said he had served two and a half years in the Canadian army and was twice wounded, came up for a job after sleeping anywhere he could find for the last two months, he said, frequently going three or four days without food. An offer of work at \$25 a month with board and clothing was the bid that brought him down from the block.

Tony Bruno, a former service man, was bid in at \$25 a month to be an assistant janitor. Others who got jobs

on bids were Frank Gennar, 17 years of age, and Arthur Burson, 23.

Wild Ducks Plentiful in Eastern Montana. GREAT FALLS, Mont., Sept. 13.—Not in many years have there been

as many wild ducks on Lake Bowdin as there are this year, according to State Senator H. H. Kirton of Malta, Mont.

"Tens of thousands of ducks of species that ordinarily go to the far north for the nesting season spent the summer in the vicinity of the lake," the senator said. "Nesting

conditions were apparently unusually favorable and the ducks remained in Montana rather than continue their flight into Canada. One reason for their remaining was that the water in the lake is higher than it has been in several years."
