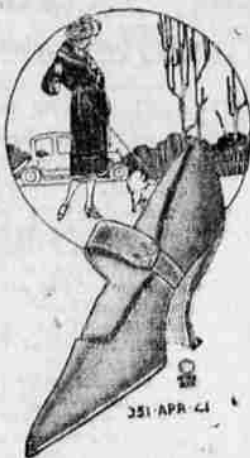

ELSWORTH TELLS OF EARLY DAYS

Former La Grande News paperman draws on memory's Reservoir for Cows Happenings of Old.

The following are some of the bits of news reported from The Cove, from May to November, 1882, to the La Grande Gazette, and other Union county newspapers, by John W. Elsworth, then a cub reporter, afterwards employed many years by various eastern Oregon newspapers and the Portland Oregonian.

COVE, Ore., May 11, 1882. Some of the gourmands will flock to the Cove to feast on the luscious cherry and carve the fat strawberry.

The sawmills, tannery and French's flouring mill are running to their fullest capacity.

Cheese reads at 16 to 20 cents and a fine lot is daily manufactured at the Cove cheese factory.

Deer are plentiful in this vicinity. Forty were recently seen a little over two miles from town.

At the French place there are tons of dried prunes and prunes from last year's crop. They sell at a good price here, and 1000 pounds went to Bait & Church, Island City, on Friday.

The milk from 125 cows is being used daily at Cove cheese factory.

Hunters have killed ten deer last week near here, and Cove folks have been cooking on venison steaks.

Mount Fanny, near the Cove, is 5,275 feet above sea level.

Mr. Steele, railroad contractor, has bought from William Holmes, executor of the French estate, 20 four and five year old work horses, paying \$2,400.

The families of Mr. Pendleton, of Western; J. L. Carter, Island City, and Harry Wright, La Grande, were recuperating at the Cove last week, and they were beset by the hail of Westswept Varmint Agency, over the Union Pacific.

Miss Helen Adams of Cottage Grove, Lane county, came to the Cove to see the place, and to give to her cousin, Mr. Harry Steele, a horse.

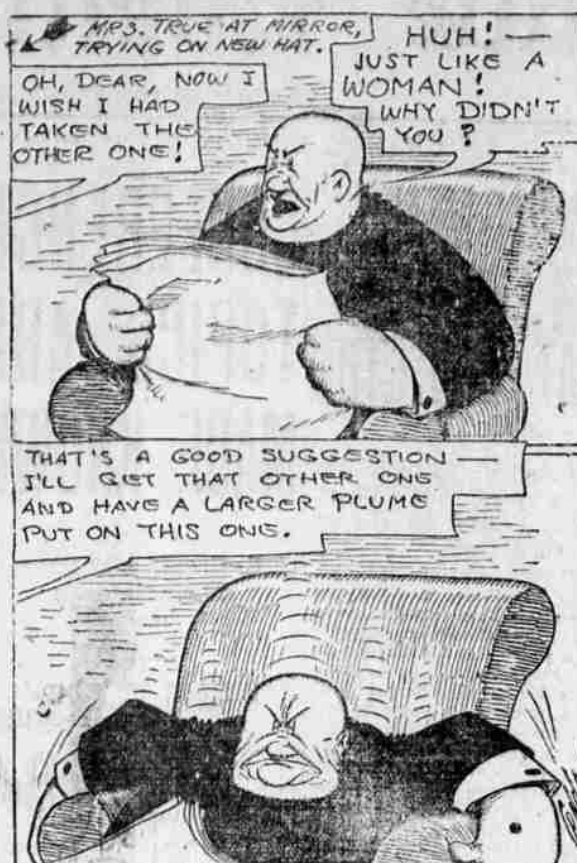
Following the lead example of others, J. Russell is building a barn, 30x22 feet.

The French land of 300 acres, including a few cows, and 10,000 bushels of wheat, valued at \$1,000, was sold to John M. Poy for \$200.

John M. Poy has harvested 200 tons of hay and his cow barn will store 150 tons.

This year nearly 500 tons of hay

was harvested on the French ranch. The Stevens' store has added to its stock of drugs, candies, rifles, shot guns, revolvers and sporting goods.

Flour is 25 per barrel and wheat \$1.10 per bushel.

Frank Wilson, late of the Oregon University, will conduct the new public school at Big Creek, near Wright's medical springs.

An addition is being built to the Russell Cochran blacksmith shop. Let the Cove hear from those boastful Pendleton professionals. On Tuesday evening, Fred J. Holmes and John W. Elsworth ran a 60-yard foot race; Holmes winning by less than a foot. Time 6 seconds.

Dairy cows sell for \$25 to \$30 a head; oats and barley 80 cents a bushel.

Joe Fille, a Cove shoemaker, out-puts hand-made boots, made from Cove Tannery leather, which wear well for over three years.

Sandhill cranes are now gathering together and skedaddling southward. Five hundred hogs were sold yesterday from the French ranch for four cents a pound, live weight; and 15,000 pounds of bacon was also sold.

Sheriff Roe Rogers and Assessor Goodall showed their genial faces in Cove today.

Cowles & McDaniel have leased the Cove flouring mill for one year. The French plum and prune orchard, the largest in Union county, covers 40 acres and contains 4,000 bearing trees. Twelve "hands" are employed at the fruit drier.

Mrs. E. P. McDaniel was the first white lady to ascend the highest peak above the Cove, now called Mt. Fanny, from her first name.

Perhaps the finest Union county team for carriage and work purposes is owned by James Payne, of Cove. Gray and black stallions. They are good for heavy work and can trot a mile under three minutes. Horsemen have said the team is worth \$1,000.
