PARIS, Sept. 13.—The British Prime Minister, Lloyd George, had it all his own way, on the subject of afternoon tea, at least during the meeting of the Supreme Council held in Paris in August. True to the old English custom, at five o'clock sharp, a sumptuously lacquered, large silver-plated tray containing diminutive cups and tea pots, could be seen walking across the gardens of the Quai d'Orsay toward the Salle de l'Horloge.

Death Knell of Anglo-Jap Love Pact Sounded

TOKYO, Sept. 13.—The Anglo-Japanese alliance is considered a dead letter by the conservative Japanese weekly, the Herald of Asia. It has been opposing renewal of the alliance for the past year on the ground it would excite suspicions of the United States.

"The death knell of the alliance was sounded," says the Herald of Asia, "when its continuation subject to the undefined restrictions of the covenant of the League of Nations was notified to the Council of the League. Its abrogation in the event of an international agreement on the Far Eastern situation at the coming Washington conference will be only a matter of form."

BORAH MAY BE HERALD OF NEW WORK POLICY

Secretary Hoover May Act on Suggestion of Idahoan That Reclamation Work Be Pushed as Solution

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—Secretary of Commerce Hoover, in a letter received Tuesday by Senator Borah, says he has not given any thought as yet to new government reclamation work as a means of providing employment for thousands now out of work, but did not know what had happened to would confer with the reclamation service immediately and ascertain to what extent the new reclamation policy might aid in solving the unemployment situation.

The letter of the secretary was in response to Senator Borah's suggestion that an enlarged reclamation policy not only would provide work for thousands who are jobless, but would provide homes for thousands who are homeless, and in the end would be accomplished without cost to the government.

Time for Move.
Senator Borah said Tuesday a concerted move by the west would bring this reclamation situation to the attention of the country and the administration, and he thought if proper action were taken by states directly affected, it might be possible to secure some action by congress when it convenes later this month.

Personally, Senator Borah believes no reclamation bill can pass congress that is confined to irrigation of arid lands. He believes reclamation of arid lands should be coupled in one bill with reclamation of swamp land, so as to insure the joint support of the south and west.

Senator Borah bases his judgment on conferences he has had with a number of southern senators, who told him flatly they will not support the pending McNary-Smith bill on the assurance of western senators that they will later give their support to a separate bill providing for reclamation of swamp lands.

Must See Reward.
These southern senators say provision for reclamation of swamp lands must be coupled in one bill with the proposal to reclaim arid lands before they will support it.

With the Federation of Labor preparing to launch a campaign in support of land reclamation legislation, and with the possible support of Secretary Hoover, Senator Borah believes the time is at hand for the west to make a forward move in congress.

Old-Timer Finds Big Changes in Baker City

BAKER, Sept. 14.—A visitor in Baker yesterday was Walter J. Burwell, who in the early '80s was in the mercantile business at North Powder with Hughes brothers, in the day of O. R. & N. railway construction and an intimate friend of E. H. Mix, the locating engineer at that time. Later he came to Baker and with Al Holman opened the Arlington hotel bar, one of the handsomest in the city. Col. W. R. Usher, still living, a resident of Richland, at the age of 84 years, one of Baker county's grand old men, being the proprietor of the hotel proper.

After leaving Baker, about 1885, Mr. Burwell went to California, and about three years ago returned to Eastern Oregon, locating at Union.

Mr. Burwell's visit to Baker recalls lively days in the history of this community and the rapid changes that have taken place. Then he was a conspicuous figure in its make up, now he is almost a total stranger, only remembered by the few who are left to record the history of that day.

They denied being present when the alleged attack took place, but Semmacher testified that he returned to the party in time to see Miss Rappe lying in great pain on the bed. He afterward visited the girl, he said, and she told him: "Roscoe hurt me."

Arbuckle's mood throughout the day was one of indifference to everything but the weaving out of the story of the tragedy at the inquest. He paid no attention to newspaper photographers snapping him from all sides, declined the many questions that were asked him by newspaper and other interviewers and seemed to show a disposition to let things take their course without direction from him.

Two of three nurses who testified Tuesday said Miss Rappe had mentioned Arbuckle's name and one of them, Miss Vera Cumberland, said that she withdrew from the case because the patient was not getting adequate medical attention and because proper examinations were not being made to determine the nature of Miss Rappe's injury.

According to Mrs. Jean Jameson, also a nurse, Miss Rappe made contradictory statements to her, first that she was not hurt, then that she was. At another time the patient declared, Mrs. Jameson said, that Arbuckle ought to pay for her hospital treatment.

Miss Cumberland said Miss Rappe told her she had had an adventure at the party with Arbuckle which she did not want her friend Henry Lehrey not only would provide work for man, New York motion picture director, to know about.

Owing to the district attorney's objections, Zey Provost and Alice Blake were not called before the Rappe inquest today.
