NEW FACTORY FOR LA GRANDE ASSURED

The company proposed to not buy timber on the stump but will deal primarily with mills already established.

The original quota of men anticipated to operate the plant will be 50, and in addition to that, the factory should make it possible for smaller mills in the county to increase their activity, insuring employment of more or less permanent nature to 200 men in the various points where the mills now exist. Of course, the company hopes to increase its volume and to add new commodities of output from time to time.

John Chapman, who has been making his home in La Grande for some little time while making the investigations and going into an extensive study of La Grande as a center of what is proposed to be the leading industry of its kind in the inland district. He is an experienced millman, versed in the selling and manufacturing ends alike.

The announcement of the final decision to build the factory here was made to the Ad Club today, and the is justifiable gratification in the ranks of that body because a new industry has been added to La Grande's category of factories, and that a very substantial addition to the gross payroll has been realized. The present paucity of residences emphasizes the need of the construction of several additional homes within the immediate future.

Another important phase in this connection is that at present a big majority of the small mills have been unable to operate on account of marketing conditions. The new factory here will have a very decided tendency to set all these small mills to work, and it can be said that as a general result of the coming of the factory to La Grande, another 200 men now idle in the county as a whole will be given employment. On this assumption, the added payroll to La Grande and the county will not only be that embraced in the 50 men in the factory here, but 200 more, or, in round figures, \$275,000.00 for the county annually. Only a very small fraction of the 200 men necessary to operate these mills are now at work.
