Followers of William Farnum—and they are legion—will find fine entertainment in his latest picture, "His Greatest Sacrifice," which is being shown at the Arcade Theatre today and Saturday.

In this story Mr. Farnum's superb acting ability, which has been a great asset to the screen, stands out more clearly than usual. Can a man be resuscitated after being officially hung and pronounced dead by State authorities?

A rather startling solution of this problem is reached in Robert Brunton's all-star feature, "The Devil to Pay," adapted from the famous mystery novel of that title by Frances Nimmo Greene and coming to the Star Theatre Saturday and Sunday.
