Substantial refreshments were served and Mrs. Russell was presented with a Pyrex casserole.

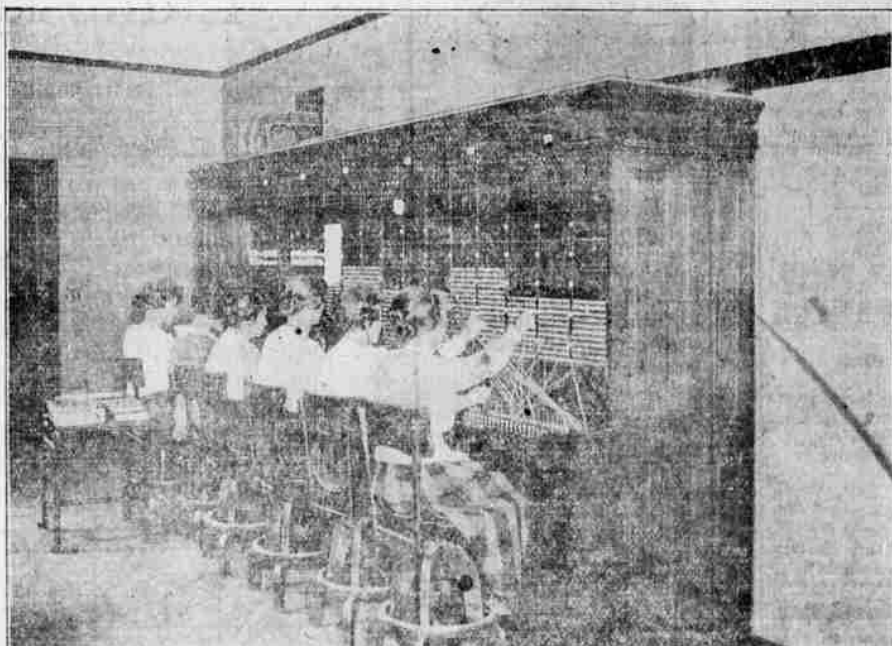
