JORDON VALLEY COAL EXAMINED

Burning Qualities are Being Examined for First Time. Ledge Outcrops Several Inches.

JORDON VALLEY, Sept. 19.—That there were coal deposits in the hills along Succor creek has been known for years as it crops out in several places. The ledge where it shows up is only a few inches thick and has never heretofore been prospected as to amount or its burning qualities. Three weeks ago D. D. Joslyn, Earl Bennett and Victor Wade made some investigation and located a vein that had never shown up before and in following it into the hill it increased in thickness and quality to look like a commercial proposition. The necessary steps were taken to cover the land adjacent to the find with a working lease from the government that further exploration might be made. Several samples were taken from the ledge where it is covered with only a light covering of earth and tested for burning and heating properties. It was found to burn into white ash, leaving no clinkers and make a hot fire.

Last Saturday evening these gentlemen, in company with the editor of the Express went to the scene of the find and spent Sunday and Monday prospecting, and incidentally, did some mighty hard work with pick and shovel. What they discovered was enough to warrant the belief that the ledge whereabouts had been unknown since, has commercial worth and within the next few days some teams will be put to work to uncover the coal.

The finding of a commercial body of coal situated as this would add to the wealth of this country more than most any other discovery. It would furnish fuel to the residents of the valley at a reasonable price and help in the development of many other enterprises that must have a cheaper fuel to make them pay.

There has been talk of coal deposits in both the Succor creek district and in the northern part of Malheur county for years but so far all indications examined by experts have been pronounced as those of “green” coal or coal in quantities that were not considered large enough to make it of much commercial value.

NATATORIUM IS TO BE OPENED

BAKER, Sept. 19.—Baker's \$200,000 municipal natatorium will be officially opened to the public on Wednesday, September 28, according to an announcement made yesterday by Mayor W. W. Gardner, who is busily engaged arranging final plans for the opening. The building will be opened at 2 o'clock Wednesday afternoon and will remain open until 10 o'clock that night, for inspection only. In the evening the dedication exercises consisting of addresses and musical numbers will be held at 7:30 o'clock. A swimming exhibition by Captain C. Milo Godfrey and George Oliver, professional long distance swimmer, will also be given. The pool will be opened to bathers according to present plans at 9 o'clock Thursday morning, Sept. 29, and in the evening a grand opening ball will be given for the public. Committees in charge of the various features of the opening will be announced by Mayor Gardner Monday.

Accused Officials of Miners' Union Give Themselves Up to Law

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Sept. 19.—C. F. Keeney and Fred Mooney, president and secretary, respectively, of District 17, of the United Mine Workers of America, against whom indictments were recently returned in Mingo county, growing out of the fatal shooting at Merimas last May, and whose whereabouts had been unknown since, surrendered at the office of Gov. E. F. Morgan, according to an official statement.

The surrender had been previously arranged, the announcement added, after Governor Morgan had promised the two men police protection to Williamson. Deputy sheriffs and members of the state police took Keeney and Mooney into custody on writs of capias.

Strawberries Were Big Money Bringers

NORTH POWDER, Sept. 19.—Mrs. Mary Gilkinson has demonstrated just what can be done in North Powder in the way of gardening. On 1500 square feet of garden space she raised and picked 480 boxes of overbearing strawberries, the equivalent of 20 crates. Had these berries brought only ten cents per box the amount realized in money would be \$48 or \$1,344 per acre. Mrs. Gilkinson sold this berries this year for 12½c per box, which netted her \$60.
