STOCK ENTRIES WILL BE BEST

State Fair This Year Will Surpass All Others in the Livestock Division.

SALEM, Sept. 20.—(Special.)—Livestock entries, the best ever assembled in the capital city for an annual state fair, will be seen when the big gates swing open to the Oregon public, Monday, September 26. Pacific Northwest herds are to be featured this year, with most of the larger breeders represented.

State fair officials have been laying special stress upon the livestock exhibits for the past several years, with the result that livestock men have been drawn from a distance, with their splendid showings of cattle, sheep, hogs and goats. Each season enlargements of buildings have been necessitated, the exhibits growing annually larger and finer. Through the medium of the state fair Oregon breeders have learned that their stock can compare favorably with that of any other section of the country. Some of them during the past few years have had this fact further verified through blue ribbons taken at mid-winter and Canadian stock shows. W. M. Riddle of Monmouth, Ore., who will exhibit his Cotswold sheep at the coming state fair, is one of these, in July, of this year winning first and second places in the Manitoba fair in Brandon, Man. He also took the championship for male and female Cotswolds and secured a number of honors for Lincoln. These same animals will be shown in Salem the last of this month.

Much of the higher-class entries of the recent Spokane Inter-state fair will be entered at the state fair. In this lot will be included a herd of 34 dairy cattle, representing Holstein, Jersey, Ayrshire and Guernsey breeds, which are sent out by the Oregon Agricultural College. This show herd has been covering the circuit going from Spokane to the Montana state fair, before coming to Salem, to stop off at the Washington state fair in Yakima.

Entries for these in the majority of classes will be made in the four dairy breeds. The animals are in charge of C. J. Fallock, herdman at the college, who is assisted by C. A. Henderson, assistant instructor in dairy husbandry, and by Clay Miller and H. J. Olsen, students.

PEARLS AND COALS MAY BE MIXED BY BRITISH.

POWDER RIVER PROJECT OKEYED

Surveys Have Begun for the Reclamation of 60,000 Acres of Land in Powder Valley.

BAKER, Sept. 20.—A letter has been received here by I. B. Bowen, Sr., editor of the Baker Democrat, from Congressman N. J. Siroff stating that the recommendation for the Powder River project made by Reclamation Director Davis has been approved by the Secretary of the Interior's office.

The letter says: "Judge Finney, first assistant Secretary of the Interior, and acting in the absence of Secretary Fall, has just notified me that he, Judge Finney, has approved Director Davis' recommendation of Powder River project, and has transmitted to the Budget Board estimates for four hundred thousand dollars to begin work on the project. is followed, action of Budget Board will only be made public when its estimates are submitted to the house at the December session, which meets on December 5th. Judge Finney is confident that the Budget Board will approve estimates."

The Powder River project will reclaim approximately 60,000 acres of land in the Powder river valley. A government engineer is already on the ground and the preliminary surveys are being started.
