INTELLIGENCE TESTS FAILED

New York Education Board Banks on Teachers Judgment Again After Trial of New End.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.—Intelligence tests, adapted from the army, were tried as an experiment when New York's army of 900,000 school children registered for the opening of school this fall. The Department of Education decided it would be unwise, at present, to accept the results obtained as a substitute for the teacher's judgment.

The principal aim of the tests was to devise a better classification of pupils. The theory was advanced that by keeping the brighter pupils together they would be able to progress more rapidly, while the average pupil also would be able to make normal progress. The dull students, under the theory, would be given instructions suited to their abilities.

The verbal tests were devised to test arithmetical reasoning, sentence completion, logical selection of words in sentences, general information, vocabulary, analogies and comparisons.

While a complete report has not yet been made of the results, the tests in some schools showed a considerable number of high school students whose mental age was below that of the normal pupil. Many of the low score students showed that they had been advanced through the grades too rapidly.

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ASSOCIATION TO SELL WHEAT

WICHITA, Kan., Sept. 21.—Seven million bushels of wheat have been put under pledge in Kansas by the National Wheat Growers Association, which stands on the basic principle that it shall market 100 per cent of its members' wheat.

This is the organization which insisted on at least a degree of compulsory pooling and so refused to join the movement fostered by the American Farm Bureau Federation which resulted in formation of the U. S. Grain Growers, Inc., with provision for optional pooling.

Kansas is where the national wheat growers' headquarters are located, and it gave 2,000,000 more bushels more than the 5,000,000 Sept. 1 goal the association set.

Incorporation has been effected in this state, following similar steps in Oklahoma. W. H. McGreevy of this city, national secretary-treasurer, says incorporation will follow also in Texas, Colorado, Nebraska and North Dakota.

The U. S. Grain Growers, Inc., also has taken out a state charter and is making headway.

IRISH PARLIAMENT MEETS.

BELFAST, Sept. 21.—The parliament of northern Ireland opened its autumn session here Tuesday with a full attendance of the Unionist members. Neither the Nationalists nor the Sinn Feiners, who hold a total of 12 seats, were in attendance. The session was held in the old Belfast college building.

The main business of the day was a motion to approve the purchase of Stormont Castle as the site of the new parliament buildings.
