OPENING TO BE A BIG EVENT

BAKER, Sept. 23.—The dedication of a \$200,000 municipal institution is a great event in any community, and the dedication of Baker's new Natatorium next Wednesday is going to be one of the greatest occasions of the year for Baker. There is not another natatorium in the entire Northwest the equal of Baker's which will be thrown open to the public September 28th.

Arrangements for the dedication exercises have been turned over to a committee appointed by Mayor W. W. Gardner, consisting of A. A. Smith, Charles E. DeNevo and T. G. Montgomery. Announcement of the following program for the evening was made today:

Baker Concert band will march from the corner of Main and Center at 7 p. m. At the conclusion of the march will open with music by the band, followed by a short address by Mayor Gardner, piano selection by E. R. MacLanahan of Richland; an address by Hon. John L. Rand; music. Following these, a quartet exercises in the spacious auditorium, the meeting will be dismissed and the people given an opportunity to inspect the entire building. In the swimming pool there will also be a water carnival with games put on by a number of high school students under the direction of Secretary Webster, of the Y. M. C. A. It is also expected that Capt. C. Milo Godfrey, swimming expert from Portland will be here. It is known that he will be here Thursday, but Mayor Gardner has wired him to make today's program if possible.

Mayor Gardner has sent invitations to all the mayors of Eastern Oregon to be present for the exercises and the first half of the following night.

Harry Foreman, of Wall & Co., is chairman of the committee on decorations, which will consist almost wholly of potted plants which with the white interior will be very attractive. In this connection the com-

mittee will greatly appreciate the loan of plants from the public. Those having plants can notify Mr. Foreman.

The night of Thursday, September 29, there will be a grand ball in the auditorium, arrangements for this are also going ahead and it is expected the hall will be crowded, notwithstanding it is the largest dance floor in Eastern Oregon. Already many people from other towns have announced their intention of attending the ball.
