BLACKMAIL IS CHARGED BY THE DEFENSE

Tells Straight Story.

Semacher's testimony took up most of the afternoon session. In the morning Dr. Arthur Beardslee, house physician at the Hotel St. Francis, who testified Miss Rappe after the reveal in Arbuckle's suite out of which the murder charge grew, testified he found evidence of a ruptured bladder early the morning after the party and that he advised her removal to a hospital. The defense was unable to make him admit that she could have been suffering from anything else. Doctor Beardslee stuck to his diagnosis, and said he found her writhing in pain when he was called in after the party, the pain being so great that he had to administer sedatives three times in the night. Replying to a hypothetical question regarding the cause of a torn bladder, he said an injury such as that described by the prosecution probably would have been caused by an external force such as a fall or blow, although contortions incident to violent vomiting might have produced that effect. Evidences of alcoholism were overshadowed by Miss Rappe's suffering from the rupture, Doctor Beardslee said. He testified that Mrs. Delmont who attended the injured girl, showed no signs of being under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

Defendant's Statement.

The defense pursued its questioning of Semacher with great vigor, causing him to announce almost immediately that he must have been misquoted if he had said he was Miss Rappe's manager. His acquaintance with both her and Mrs. Delmont was more or less casual until shortly before their trip to San Francisco, where they attended Arbuckle's party, he said.

HOUSE HELP IS SCARCE IN EAST

New York's Wealthy Women Forced to do Own Work Because Girls Are Few.

NEW YORK, Sept. 27.—Domestic labor is so scarce in New York that in thousands of homes, normally well supplied with servants, the mistress is doing her own housekeeping. Maids and butlers are said by employment bureaus to prefer being out of work to taking jobs at less than the high wage scales prevailing last year. Of many reasons advanced by employment agencies for the failure of servants and employers to agree, one of the most common is that prospective maids seek work only because their husbands are jobless and are refused places because prospective employers will not consider applicants for temporary positions. Prevailing wage scales are said by employment agencies to be: Cooks, \$50 to \$70 a month; general houseworkers, \$40 to \$50; chambermaids, \$50 to \$60. Japanese butlers command \$100 to \$125 a month with board and lodging.

MULTNOMAH'S HOPES GO AGLIMMERING

PORTLAND, Sept. 27.—Failure of several stars to report for football practice at the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club here has dampened the hopes of the club members for a winning eleven. George Philbrook, coach at the club is securing the state of Oregon for material for the team to take the place originally assigned to former college stars who are not in the city or who have not reported. Multnomah's first game is against Whitman College here October 1. On October 8 the team goes to Corvallis to play the Oregon Agricultural College. Philbrook thinks the Oregon Aggies will be the best team in the Pacific Northwest this year, so he is making a strong effort to get them.
