ASSOCIATION GIVES ANSWER

Criticism of Wheat Growers' Administration Draw Reply From Directors.

PORTLAND, Sept. 28.—Criticism of 1920 operations of the Washington-Idaho Wheat Growers' association offered at the recent meeting of the directors, is answered in Saturday's issue of the Producer, the official paper of the organization. Some of the explanations throw considerable light on the financial side of last year's operations. The first question put was as follows:

"If it is true that the association received smaller returns than those paid to individual growers by grain dealers, why has it been unable to market to better advantage?"

"This association did not receive smaller returns than those paid to individual grain growers," says the explanation. "A check on the sales shows them to average above the market price last year on the day they were sold anywhere from 1 cents to 20 cents."

The association is not responsible for the fact that it was organizing, not selling, during the early high price period and had to make its sales mainly after the market had dropped."

Another question had to do with overhead, as follows:

"If it was enormous, why the enormous overhead expense?"
