LICENSE MONEY IS DISTRIBUTED

Secretary of State Apportioned it to the Various Counties; Union Gets Over \$3000

Sen. A. Rucker, secretary of state, has made the semi-annual distribution of automobile license fees, aggregating \$449,800.89, to the state highway fund and the various counties of the state, under the provisions of chapter 371, laws of 1921. The law provides that after the payment of administration expenses the balance remaining shall be distributed, three-fourths to the highway fund and one-fourth of the counties, in proportion to the amount that shall have been received from such counties for licenses.

The distribution represents the net proceeds from motor vehicle and operators' licenses, chauffeur registrations, etc., for the six months period, March 26, 1921, to September 15, 1921. Of the total of \$449,800.89 distributed today, the highway fund received \$337,259.97, while \$112,540.92 was divided among the thirty-six counties of the state. The amount received by each county follows:

ARBUCKLE, AT LARGE, GOES IN SECLUSION

guilt of this unfortunate; it is a universal issue. "The affair was the culmination of an orgy at one of our leading hostellers. An orgy unrepented by the management. I take it, a common thing in our big cities.

"I had really hoped that this court would be the avenue for full and complete revelation of all the facts, so the public of the entire world would have the opportunity to ascertain this widely known defendants' guilt or innocence.

"The testimony heard shows that during the whole afternoon there went on, let us charitably say, festivities. Men and women were coming and going, so that witnesses are unable to say who were the occupants at any particular hour.

"Much liquor was drunk, and the complaining witness in particular was in an inebriated condition.

"Miss Rapp, according to the picture I have tried to draw of the events, went into room 1219 of this hotel, followed, without previous conversation, by the defendant.

"They remained in there about three-quarters of an hour, according to Miss Zeh Provost's testimony. No sounds were heard by the rest of the party.

"Then the complaining witness and Miss Provost made clamor at the door, which was opened by the defendant and these two ladies entered the room.

"They found Miss Rapp lying on a bed, fully clothed, and apparently in agony. She was clutching at her clothes, and with the assistance of her women companions she was completely disrobed. I thought some of the torn garments might bear on the point at issue, but from the prosecution's own witness it appears they must have been torn in being removed."

Assistant District Attorney Isadore Golden interrupted with the assertion that the evidences showed one of the garments must have been torn off. "The court said he could not see any significance in certain other testimony introduced by the prosecution regarding the use of ice, but it had no connection with any possible injuries received by the deceased, although it was a regrettable incident.

"Photographs of bruises on Miss Rapp's body were introduced, but Dr. Arthur Beardslee, who attended her, saw only one on the arm. Undoubtedly if there had been others on the body, he would have noticed them.

"Sennacher's testimony was entirely valueless, and two days court time was taken up fruitlessly hearing him.

"The only one whose evidence might have connected that defendant with the commission of a crime was that of the nervous chambermaid who heard

from the corridor the cry of a woman shouting, "No, no; oh, my God!" and a man's reply, "Oh, shut up!"

"Although there were indications that the district attorney at a trial would try to show a more complete case there was the merest skeleton of evidence here to connect the defendant with the crime of murder, the most serious offense known in criminal law.

"The question for me to decide is whether the facts adduced, which the district attorney admits is barely enough to warrant a holding, is enough to justify a murder charge, and I do not believe so.

"There is enough in the defendant's actions in the affair, however, to warrant a manslaughter charge, and I will hold him on this. I feel that no rape, or attempted rape, was committed by the defendant."

Assistant District Attorney Milton T. U'Ren inquired what these other actions might be, and the judge replied that there might have been battery, for instance.

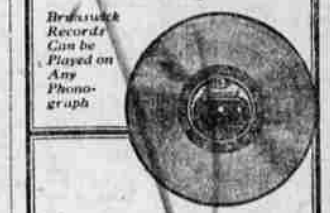

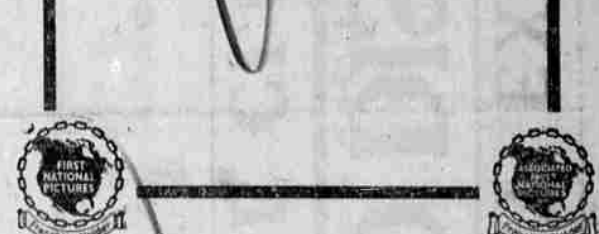
