PUBLIC HEALTH ASSOCIATION HOLDS MEETING

Officers Elected For Enriching Year by Union County Society: C. E. Short President.

The second annual meeting of the Union County Public Health Association was held Tuesday at the City Hall. A representative group of people was present. Some very interesting reports were given of the work done in all parts of the county by the various community vice-presidents, the committee chairman, and Miss Louise Zorn, county nurse.

Miss Zorn's report covered the time from the beginning of the work in Union county and was most gratifying. Much has been done and much is still to be done.

The constitution of the association was amended to provide for membership dues of 50 cents per year, so that there might be a closer and more tangible organization, as well as to provide funds for the carrying on of the business of the association apart from the expenses of the nurse, which are met by the tax budget. The association also amended the by-laws to eliminate the election of an executive committee and provided for an advisory committee and an educational committee to take over some of the educational publicity carried in the past by the nurse.

Among the visitors present was Miss Grace Holmes, Oregon Tuberculosis Association, Bureau of Surveys, and Miss Elizabeth Hopper, Crusade Director for the same organization. Miss Holmes brought to the county association a message from the northwestern sectional conference of the Tuberculosis association, which was held in Salt Lake last week. "The most significant note of the whole conference," Miss Holmes said, "was the emphasis placed on the care and health of the children." Nutrition was another point stressed and milk as an important part of the growing child's diet was emphasized by a report from Los Angeles.

The schools there have made an extensive survey covering eight years and have that in this period which is the time required for a child to go through the grades, a child who drank milk as a regular part of his diet every day during the entire time was able to finish the eight grades, two years sooner than the child who did not have milk.

Miss Hopper spoke on the development of the modern health crusade in the different states of the Northwest section. She said the Crusade is undergoing an adaption by which it will be more suited to the curriculum of the schools of the country. Miss Hopper also told of the crusade in Oregon, what was done by the children last year and made a strong plea to the association to get behind this work and help the nurse and the state association make it a success.

Miss Cecil L. Schroyer, associate director of the bureau of public nursing and child hygiene, of the state board of health, was also present and urged the association to take up the sale of the Christmas seals with even more vigor than usual this year. The work of the association is growing and should continue to do so and to expand their activities as the association must have money.

The report of the nominating committee was given, and the following officers elected for the coming year: President, C. E. Short, La Grande; Vice-President, Mrs. A. G. Conklin, Cove; Secretary, Mrs. Jno. Thieson, La Grande; Treasurer, Mrs. Hazel Shoemaker, Elgin; Community Vice-Presidents: Mrs. Ray W. Logan, La Grande; Mrs. Geo. Blair, Union; Mrs. Lewis Denham, Elgin; Mrs. L. B. Russell, North Powder.

A vote of appreciation was given Mrs. George Cochran for her long and efficient service as president of the association.

Bee Colony Turns To Criminal Acts

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Sept. 29.—A crime wave has broken out among bees.

This became known Wednesday when H. J. Case, of Canandaigua, an apiarist, reported a horde of bees had flown into his warehouse through a broken window, drained every drop of honey out of his combs and escaped with two tons of the sweet liquid.

The raiding party, however, suffered heavy casualties, for Case picked up four bushels of dead bees which apparently had fallen exhausted.

tem has been entirely wiped out so far as boys of this age are concerned.

Boys of this age will in the future join the Y. M. C. A. by affiliating themselves with some club or other boys organization which has the approval of the organization, such as Sunday school clubs, the Boy Scouts, the Hi-Y club, or others similar in purpose which provide for the four-fold development of the boy, mental, physical, social and devotional.

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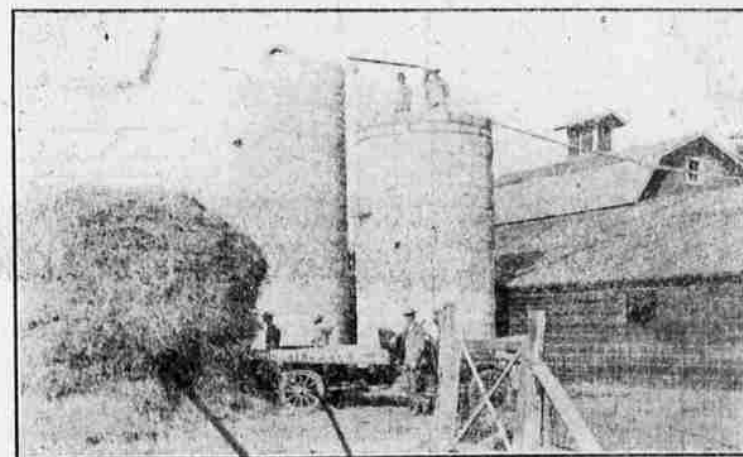
