increased rates. The next case to be heard by the court, according to schedule, relates to prohibition regulations, in which Charles Cornell and George J. Qhlo seek to remove to their homes certain distilled spirits which they have had in bonded warehouses since before the constitutional amendment was adopted. The E. I. DuPont de Nemours Powder Company case is the third among the assigned cases presenting the question whether stock issued by a newly created company for distribution among stockholders of the parent company is subject to the Federal income tax. It will be followed by the reorganization of the American Column & Lumber case.

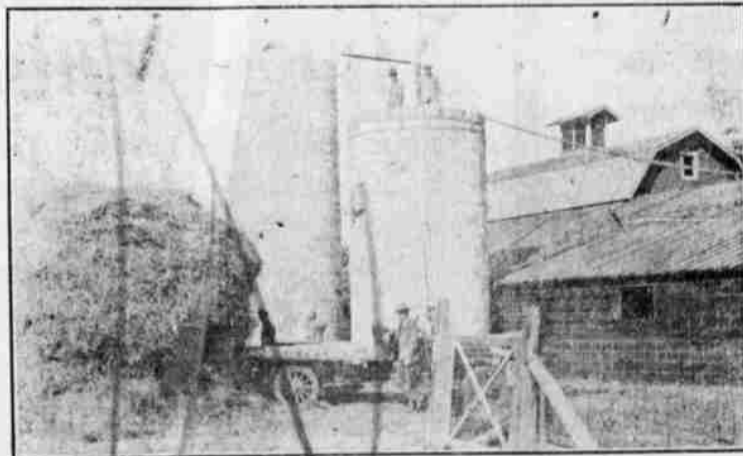
