MORE SYMPATHY IN BANKING

Speaker at Convention of
Bankers Suggests Chang-
es in Reserve Act be Made

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 4.—The
injection of a little human sympathy
into the Reserve Act will do no harm,
Henry M. Campbell, of Detroit, Chair-
man of the Legislative committee told
the members of the American Bank-
ers Association in session here today.

"Section 203 of the new act amends
section 202 of the act of 1913, so as
to provide that in the case of gifts
made after December 31, 1920, the val-
ue, as a basis for taxation in case of
sale, shall be the cost to the donor or,
the last preceding owner by whom it
was not acquired by gift," said Mr.
Campbell, "while in the case of be-
quests, devises and inheritances, the
basis is the value at the time the be-
quests take effect. This distinction is
illogical and unfair. Some academic
theorists must have devised this
scheme.

"Sentimental reasons alone are suf-
ficient to justify fixing the value of
property at the time the gift is re-
ceived, as the basis for ascertaining
the gain or loss, in case of sale. The
significance of the gift is lost if it
must be accepted subject to the re-
quirement that the donee must as-
certain the cost and in case of sale
must pay a tax upon the basis of
what the gift cost the donor or the
last preceding owner by whom it was
not acquired by gift.

"The difficulty of determining the
cost of the gift to the donor or the
last preceding owner by whom it was
not acquired by gift is also likely in
many cases to be insurmountable. In-
cluded in the gifts subject to the act
are heirlooms, books and manuscripts,
works of art, cherished household be-
longings, Christmas gifts, wedding
presents and many other things whose
value lies chiefly in the sentiment at-
tached to them. Imagine the recipi-
ents of a wedding present replying to
the donor: 'We gratefully acknowledge
acceptance of your gift provided you

furnish us with a certified statement in
the absence of all information
available for the purpose.

"There has been some apprehension
on the part of the trust companies—
and there is ground for the apprehen-
sion—that the word 'gift' as used in
the Revenue Act might be construed
to include what are generally known as
voluntary or living trusts. The vol-
untary trust is not a gift, but is more
of the nature of a transfer under a
general appointment, or in contempla-
tion of death."

has been here for the past ten days.

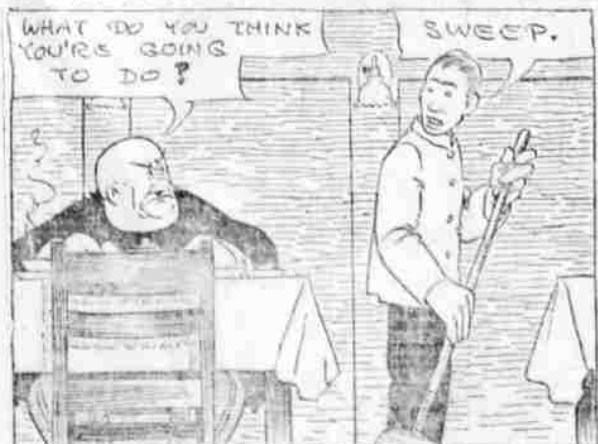
Miss Doris Eastman of Boise, Idaho,
