

PRIMATIAL TOWN IS GIVEN SHOCK

Minister of Finance Wanted to Hold Political Meeting on Sunday in Ireland.

ARMAGH, Ireland, Sept. 15.—Armagh, the primatial city of Ireland both Catholic Cardinal and the Protestant Primate having their seats here, was shocked when it learned that Michael Collins, Minister of Finance in the Republican Cabinet and member for Armagh in the Dail Eireann, was to hold a political demonstration here on a Sunday.

The demonstration passed off quietly but the after celebration awakened the old city out of years of lethargy.

The speech-making over, the spinners of roulette wheels, men, women and children, gathered along the main street and soon gambling, chiefly in pennies and shillings was proceeding at a rate that might have made the concessionaires of French watering places envious.

This is not uncommon in the south of Ireland which in this respect is much like the Latin countries but in the north it is frowned upon.

Dances were also organized and it was daylight Monday morning before the revellers brought their celebration to a conclusion.

Michael Collins seemed reluctant to return to Dublin early in the evening. He is the sort of an Irishman, who after work would enjoy just such a revel—a great big boy full of humor and play.

The fact that travel is beginning to spread out into August, September and October, including the Indian summer—when all roads and trails are open and the High Sierra country can be reached—shows that the public is heeding the advertising and the congestion which has marked June in previous years will not handicap the Park in the future.

"Our winter advertising has served to introduce Californians to the new delights of snow sports—tobogganing, skiing, snowshoeing—in the midst of California's sunshine. It will not be long judging from the success of last winter's travel and reservations for this season, before Yosemite is as popular in November, December and January, as it now is in June and July.

"We are looking forward to increasing Yosemite's lead over other Parks, as our all-year advertising will be maintained in keeping with our all-year season. News stories will be used to supplement our paid advertising, but they cannot take its place."

USE OF UNIFORM IS RESTRICTED

German President Forbids Wearing of Uniforms by Former Officers of Army

USE OF UNIFORM.—BERLIN, Oct. 5.—President Ebert's order forbidding former army officers to appear in public in their old uniforms, except when attending the funeral of a comrade, has brought a protest from the monarchists who declare there are many officers who are too impoverished to buy civilian clothes and that therefore the President's decree means virtual imprisonment for them.

The order was issued to curb monarchistic agitation, in which officers parading in resplendent uniforms have been playing a conspicuous role and strikes particularly at Prince Eitel Friedrich, General Ludendorff and Field Marshal von Hindenburg, who seldom appear in public except in full army regalia.

The order applies to ex-officers as well as officers, but the former are permitted to wear their uniforms if buttons and insignia of the Kaiser's regime are removed.

The monarchists have been agitating against the republic through the medium of soldiers' organizations such as "The Front Fighters," "The Steel Helmet," and "The National Association of Soldiers."

The movement received the enthusiastic support of a number of newspapers, which became so outspoken that the government suppressed them and issued a warning that further agitation would not be tolerated.

Labor organizations have assumed a united front against the associations of officers and soldiers who are seeking to reestablish a monarchy and, in the campaign of propaganda which has followed, serious threats and charges and counter-charges have been made.

The Socialists and Communists and in fact all the ultra-radicals, have enlisted in support of labor "to save the republic." While they are not unanimous in supporting the present government they are of one mind in the belief that the monarchists must be completely eradicated.

One of the chief arguments of the labor organizations in their agitation against the monarchists is that a return to the old regime would mean the loss of the eight hour day, which has been the workman's principal benefit of the war and the revolution.

The monarchists are meeting this argument with the assertion that under a monarchy the cost of living would be reduced at least by half, and it is known that a certain percentage of the working population, hard hit by low wages and high prices, is listening attentively to this appeal, remembering pre-war conditions, when there was plenty of food for all at prices which the poorest paid wage earner could pay.

The controversy between these two factions has resulted in another "class war," in which both sides have been preaching the doctrine of hate, apparently with a n unalterable antagonism to compromise. Many speakers on both sides have advocated resort to any sort of weapon and recent political murders have so intensified the hatred that there are observers who believe civil war is not improbable.

Must Improve Her Harbor or Lose Fleet Says Navy

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Oct. 5.—Los Angeles must improve her harbor to keep the Pacific fleet, Admiral E. W. Eberle, commander-in-chief, told the members of the Chamber of Commerce here recently.

"You must have ample harbor facilities," he said. "The fleet came here two years ago and has since used the local harbor as an operating and exercising base, but the berthage has never been adequate, and now we have been asked by your harbor authorities to give up part of the anchorage we have been using. If you expect us to base here, you must allow us sheltered and proper anchorage. If we vacate any more we might as well go into the open sea."
