DIDN'T LIKE A NEW CUSTOM

Banker Scores Former Controller for Asking for Information Never Asked for in 58 Years.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 5.—Thomas B. Patton, general counsel for the American Bankers' Association, in addressing the convention of that organization here today, after discussing the subject of federal legislation referred to the call for publication of bank salaries by former Controller of the Currency John Skelton Williams.

"For the first time in the 58 years history of the national banking system," he said, "the controller on February 21, shortly before his retirement from office, issued a call for reports for publication of items showing the aggregate amount of salaries paid to officers and employees. General objection was immediately voiced to the publication of this information and President McKee of the national bank division officially protested to the controller and also called upon general counsel for an opinion as to the power of the controller of the currency to force the reporting banks to publish this confidential information."

"An opinion was promptly rendered in which the conclusion was reached that a statement of salaries paid did not come within the spirit or meaning of the law, not being a statement of the bank's resources or liabilities and that the controller had exceeded his authority in making the requirement that the banks should publish this confidential information. This opinion was given wide publicity and a large number of national banks did not publish the information. The matter has not been pressed since by the controller's office."

Among the subjects of federal legislation in which the general counsel participated, the report said, were the bill proposing a tax of one fourth of one per cent on bank deposits, to be charged by the bank to the depositor. The measure was opposed before the ways and means committee and was subsequently tabled.

One measure provided for the establishment of savings department of national banks and special investment of capital and assets in a plan to relieve the housing shortage. It was pointed out that "a simple amendment to section 24 of the Federal Reserve Act would enlarge the power of national banks to loan on real estate."

The subject at present rests in the files of the committee on banking and currency in both houses.

"Our association," said Mr. Patton, "is vitally interested in federal regulation of fraudulent securities and has been cooperating with the investment bankers' association in the procuring of federal legislation which will adequately regulate the evil."

Two bills are pending in Congress which provide different methods of regulation, the Deussen bill and the Volstead bill. General counsel favored the Volstead bill, he said, because it was intended to curb the sale and offering of fraudulent securities through special committees in each federal reserve district.

NEW HOLIDAY SUGGESTED

ST. PAUL, Minn., Oct. 5.—Favorable observance of Magna Charta day, June 15, in the United States, Canada, New Zealand, Australia, South Africa, Great Britain, Ireland and New Zealand is being agitated by the Magna Charta association.

It is not intended by its promoters that a holiday should be declared on that day, but they seek general acknowledgment of the day through magazine articles, newspaper editorials and sermons from pulpits.

"We wish only to educate the English speaking nations to the origin of all modern civil and religious liberties and our movement is purely educational," it was explained by Dr. W. J. Johnson, St. Paul, who is on the executive committee.

Senator Offered a Job as U. S. Judge

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Senator Kenyon of Iowa, Republican, is considering an offer of appointment as federal judge for the northern Iowa district.

President Harding has let the Iowa senator know he may have the place if he wishes it and Mr. Kenyon has not yet determined whether he will take it or remain in the senate.

Senator Kenyon is expected to announce his decision today. He has conferred, it is understood, with Secretary Wallacer, also of Iowa, and several of his colleagues in the senate and the house regarding the proposed judgeship. Most of them are said to have urged him to remain in congress and his friends say they believe he is inclined to remain.

TO TEST DEATH MACHINE

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—A new 16-inch, 80-caliber rifle, said to be more powerful than any naval gun now in use, and other new developments in armaments, will be tested at the army ordnance proving ground at Aberdeen, Md., Friday when "ordnance day" will be celebrated. New types of artillery, shells, tanks and bombs also will be tried out.
