Giants Snow Yanks Under 13 to 5

THIRD GAME MARKED BY GREAT SCORE

Giants Kick Up a Lot of Dust in Seventh Inning

BASE HITS RAINED BY WINNERS SURPRISE

Three Yankee Hurlers Are Cuffed Off the Mound by Their Opponents Today

POLO GROUNDS, New York, Oct. 7.—The Giants emerged from their batting slump today, cuffed three Yankee hurlers off the mound and submerged the American League champions by a score of 13 to 5 in the third game of the world series.

Thirty thousand spectators saw the Giants rain base hits all over the place in the seventh inning. When the dust settled the score board showed eight runs for the Giants.

The Yanks took the lead in the third by getting to Toney for four runs, but the Giants came back and tied the score.

In the third Burns replaced Toney as pitcher for the Giants. Quinn replaced Shawkey in the box for the Yankees in the third.

Quinn and Collins were knocked out of the box and Rogers took their place in the eighth.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—The New York Americans made world's series history here Thursday, putting out the Giants, 3 to 0, in the second game of the struggle, leaving the New York Nationals runners after 18 innings of play in the first two days of the city clubs' conflict.

Unlike the opening encounter, Thursday's game was played before a crowd that taxed the capacity of the Polo grounds, and let itself loose at frequent intervals in zipping outbursts of enthusiasm. It had plenty to justify itself, for the contest, while a pitchers' battle between Hoyt and Art Nehf, who twirled stellar ball for the Giants, was replete with rattling plays and tense moments. Possibly the thing that most encouraged the followers of the Yankees, looking forward to the ultimate outcome of the series, was the splendid game pitched by Hoyt, who held the Giants to one hit up to the ninth. Never before has a world series opened with two straight shutouts of the same contest.

Airright Pitching.

So airtight was Hoyt's pitching that the Giants never had more than four men at the plate in any one inning. The nearest they came to the home plate was in the ninth inning, when Frisch, with one down, singled to right and went to second when Young was given a base on balls. He was on his way home from second as a fast double play on Young and Kelly ended the inning and the game. The only other man to get to second was Nehf, who was given a base on balls and went down on an out.

Aside from Hoyt's marvelous twisting, the game revealed "Babe" Ruth in a new role, that of the demon base stealer—a role that seemed just about as popular with the crowd as his familiar one of home run king. The great lumbus stole second and third in rapid succession in the fifth inning, and his clean pilfering of the far corner was greeted with the wildest demonstration of the series to date.

Ruth's Plunge.

At the last Ruth's record was 100. He didn't even consider getting out, but in trying to cut the corner he issued three passes to the big fellow, such to the disgust of apparently the greater portion of the crowd. Ruth scored a run, however, getting on the base once through a fielder's choice and finally tallying. Ruth's base stealing feat was performed late in the ninth and didn't result in a run.

CIRCUIT COURT HEARS FOUR CASES IN WEEK

Charge Against Defendant In Suit Over Ring Dismissed and Judgment Against Attorney Given

Circuit court has cleaned up all of the cases set for this week. Ordinarily some case or other causes a day or two's delay, but the first week in this term of court has averaged a case a day and today and tomorrow court is not in session.

In the case of Lloyd A. Chandler vs. Edith Miller, a suit to recover the value of a diamond ring, the charges against Miss Miller were dismissed and judgment brought for \$163 against R. J. Kitchen, her attorney.

The way this was brought about was this: Miss Miller gave the ring to Mr. Kitchen as security for his attorney fee. Thereupon the attorneys for the plaintiff amended their complaint to make Mr. Kitchen a party to the suit. Later, during the trial, the attorneys for the defense moved to withdraw the charges against Miss Miller. The jury then decided against the remaining plaintiff in the case.

According to the evidence presented by the defense the ring was given to her by the defendant as a birthday present and she insisted on accepting that it be understood that no obligations were attached to accepting it. When she wore it she never wore it on the left hand. The plaintiff alleged that it was an engagement ring, but produced no proof of his alleged engagement.

Defendant stated that at no time was she engaged to plaintiff and in fact did not care for him. Plaintiff however lavished presents on her in trying to force his attention on her. Later when the young man understood that his hopes of winning the girl of his choice were nil, as they had been from the start, he decided to get the ring back and in doing so made various threats. He said that he would have her arrested for larceny by bailee and thereupon Miss Miller decided that although she could no longer wear the ring because of her feelings, that she would not give it back to him and when she took her case to her attorney he had him take it as security for attorney fees connected with the case.

A verdict of \$70 in favor of Wong Sing was returned in the case of Wong Sing vs. W. C. Martin. Wong bought some pool hall fixtures from Martin on contract. When the sale was consummated Martin took his copy of the contract and wrote the bill of sale on the bottom of it. Later Wong tried to take some fixtures which in the contract as originally written were excepted from the sale, belonging to Julia Roesch. In pencil this clause had been stricken out of each copy of the contract, Wong alleging that this was done before the sale was made. The jury found in his favor.

In the case of L. Swan vs. Walter V. Thompson, Judge Knowles directed a verdict for the plaintiff. This was a suit over a note of \$200 which plaintiff had been stricken out of each copy of defendant alleged had never been delivered. The note was sold to Swan later by the original holder.

Twenty-five Wounds Found on Body of 15-Year-Old Child.

MADISON, N. J., Oct. 7.—Pierced by twenty-five knife wounds, apparently the work of a maniac, the body of Janet Lawrence, 12 year old school girl, was found behind a log in the woods near here. The police asserted she had been attacked. A peculiar knot in the twine with which the child's hands were tied behind her was said by the police to be used only in greenhouses to bind rose bushes. This is the only clue to the murderer.

WILLIAMS TAKES ANOTHER FIRST

La Grande Boy Wins in Salt Lake City Auto Races.

Word has been received here to the effect that Red Williams, La Grande boy, who is in Salt Lake City driving a car from Baker in the races there, has won additional victories. In the five-mile race for light cars, Williams with a Studebaker took first in 6:29. With a Nash, Williams developed engine trouble in the first heat of the race and had to withdraw. Williams is going up against special racing cars with regular stock models and his showing is therefore all the more interesting to his friends.

Hundreds Apply to Red Cross for Aid

Cost of Liquor In Bond to Rise

Additional Tax Is Recommended by Senate Committee

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—A tax of \$4 per gallon on all alcoholic spirits withdrawn from bond for industrial, medicinal or any other purpose has been agreed upon by Republican leaders as a part of the new tax program. This is an increase of \$1.80 per gallon and is expected to yield \$75,000,000 additional revenue annually.

The proposal to repeal the \$2,000 exemption allowed corporations was abandoned because it would work a hardship on small corporations. The senate leaders also agreed on a flat corporation income tax of 15 per cent instead of the 10 and 15 per cent rate.

FINE AND JAIL GIVEN BURG

Man Who Attacked Girl on Viaduct Gets 30 Days in Jail and \$300 Fine.

Henry Burg pled guilty last night in municipal court to a charge of assault and was fined \$300 and sentenced to 30 days in jail. According to the complaint that was lodged against him, he grasped Evalina Smith while she was crossing the Second street viaduct and held his hand over her mouth so that she could not cry out.

However, help came before Burg could harm the girl. The attack was made Tuesday evening.

SECOND PANEL OF TENTATIVE JURORS NAMED

Half a Hundred Men Appear for Examination as Court Opens This Morning

ROSEBURG, Oct. 7.—The second panel of 50 was ready for examination when court opened for the trial of Dr. R. M. Brumfield, alleged slayer of Dennis Russell. Following is a list of tentative jurors in the box as the result of the first panel of 24: Harry Larkins, Oakland; M. H. Payne, Yoncalla; Walter G. Costes, Ollalo; Jesse R. Clayton, Tye; Amos C. Cripp, Riddle; Q. M. Hartshorn and James Marvin, Sutherland; C. S. Hunter, Oakland; J. I. Roach, Tillam; Walter Haines, Elkton.

Vincent Applegate, a Yoncalla farmer, was chosen as the eleventh prospective juror. He is 24 years of age. Most of the others are old men. The defense has 12 peremptory challenges and the prosecution six.

After twelve tentative jurors had been picked, the last being M. K. Eby, a Sutherlin farmer, the state peremptorily challenged Payne, because Brumfield had done dental work for him six years ago. The defense challenged Clayton, Hunt, Marvin, and Haines. Joseph Winfield, an Umpqua farmer and Fred Parker, Sr., a Canyonville rancher, were accepted on the tentative panel. The defense has eight challenges remaining and the state five. Brumfield complained of feeling sick today.

HUSBANDRY'S WEALTH IS ON EXHIBITION

Grange Fair Shows Diversity of Farm Products Raised Here

MANY SPEAKERS ARE ON THE PROGRAM

Poultry Demonstration Is Given Yesterday Afternoon; Curio Collection Is Large

The second day of the Grange fair was devoted to general fair exhibitions and programs. The entrances of the exhibits have all been made. The children's display occupies considerable space and the quality of the fruits and other farm products is excellent.

J. B. Tallent of Cove has a good display of honey besides other farm products. Telocent, North Powder and Cove have fine displays in all the departments.

In the farm display Adam Beck has 64 specimens of farm products, including all kinds of garden seeds, canned and preserved fruits, canned vegetables, pickles of different kinds, milk, eggs, cottage cheese, tobacco, etc.

Frank Johnson also has a large exhibit of farm products. His showing consists of seed oats, barley and wheat, eight kinds of bean seeds, five of corn, four different kinds of peas, three of crabsapples, two of prunes and thirty-one varieties of apples. He also has several specimens of five kinds of vegetables, besides milk, eggs, black walnuts, cantaloupes and 26 varieties of jellies, preserves and canned fruits.
