GULPS WHEN POISON SHOWN HER IN COURT

"How much do you estimate the organs of the two samples you examined contained?"

"Two-thirds of a grain."

"Is it not true that when arsenic is taken into the system it is disseminated throughout the body?"

"Yes," answered Mr. Rodenbaugh. "I understand it can be found in all the organs of the body, the hair, nails, and even under the finger nails."

"If this were true, how much arsenic would you estimate there was in Meyer's body?"

"The prosecuting attorney," retorting, "the weight of an average man's body is 175 kilograms, or 165 pounds; his body would have contained 0.8 grains of arsenic."

There were three samples of organs

sent Mr. Rodenbaugh, one of which is now in the possession of the prosecuting attorney sealed from the day its contents were carved from the body of Edward F. Meyer at the second post mortem, a little over 24 hours from the time of his death.
