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HEPPNER TO HAVE BOYS' MEETING

Older Boys of Northeastern Oregon Will Meet in Convention.

HEPPNER, Oct. 10.—The Third Annual Conference for Older Boys of Northwest Oregon will be held in Heppner, October 14, 15, and 16. The purpose of the conference is to bring together the older boys from the different communities and cities to discuss some of the vital questions pertaining to Boy Life today. The theme of the conference is "The Price of Leadership." There will be some fine addresses by strong speakers and leaders besides plenty of time given

for discussion; and papers by older boys on other subjects.

Mr. A. E. Yount, Interstate Boys' Secretary for the Y. M. C. A. of Oregon and Idaho, who is directing the conference, said that he had secured Jas. W. Palmer, Assistant General Secretary of the Portland Y. M. C. A. for two of the principal addresses on Saturday and Sunday. Mr. Palmer will also lead the singing throughout the conference. A. F. Bittner, Institutional and Educational Director of Westminster Presbyterian church, Portland, will also be one of the speakers and W. W. Dillon, Executive Secretary of the Y. M. C. A. of Oregon and Idaho will take an active part in the program throughout the conference.

Howard M. James, Supt. of Schools at Heppner is heading up the local organization. The good people of the entertaining city are providing full entertainment for all the delegates, besides a splendid banquet Saturday night. The only expense to boys at

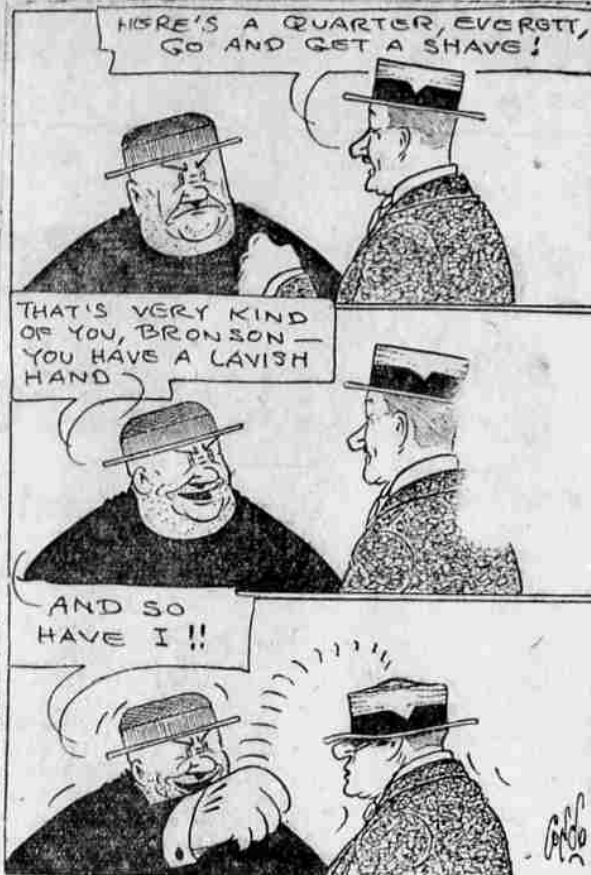
tending is the car fare and \$1.00 registration fee which is used to help defray expenses of the program. The conference opens Friday afternoon at 5:00 with a song and introduction meeting. At 5:30 there is scheduled a short address on "The Challenge" followed by the appointment of the nominating committee to nominate officers who will be elected at the evening session and will preside over the conference throughout. The evening session opens at 7:30 and after the Address of Welcome and Response, the election and installation of officers, the principal address of the evening will be given on the subject: "The Price of Physical Leadership," by A. F. Bittner, Institutional and Educational Director of the Westminster church, Portland. Saturday morning there are to be two short addresses—one on "The Price of Intellectual Leadership," by Mr. Bittner, and one on "Boys and the World Program," by J. W. Palmer, and two discussion periods. The conference photograph will be taken at noon, and after lunch there will be an open discussion followed by delegation meetings. The time from 3:10 on until 6:15 will be given over to recreation, there being a football game scheduled between Heppner and an outside team. At 6:15 the banquet will be held in the Patrick hotel and will be the big social feature of the entire conference. Sunday will probably be the best day of all. The delegation will attend church and Sunday school in the morning with their host and hostess. Then at 11:30 there will be a big mass meeting for all boys of the conference and other older boys of Heppner. This meeting will be addressed by W. W. Dillon on "The Price of Christian Leadership." The closing session of the conference will be held Sunday evening at 7:30 when there will be short talks by boys and leaders, and a short address by Jas. W. Palmer. This meeting is open to the public generally.

Mr. Yount expects to see between 150 and 175 boys registered at the conference.
