WINSTOCK TALKS PEACE PROGRAM

Well Known Movie Film
Actor Expects Great Results from the November Meeting.

Melvia G. Winstock of Portland, Oregon is here arranging for the forthcoming appearance of "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" based on the book by the great Spanish author. For fear of press agenting claim he refuses to say much of the picture but the fact remains that the world has acclaimed this as a deserved super feature and the public will approve.

Mr. Winstock is much more deeply interested in the outcome of the Disarmament Conference to be held at Washington, D. C. beginning November 11 at the call of President Harding.

"I regard this assemblage," said Mr. Winstock as the most fateful ever held in human history. The treaty discussion at Paris three years ago was too close to the conflict for wise and conservative action. It took no note of the past agonies of mankind. It wrought not for tomorrow. It was a secret disposition of world matters based on the unchecked power of the conqueror. It had no regard for the economic necessities of differing states. It had no ideals of its own and those of Woodrow Wilson were brushed aside. It degenerated into a Titanic struggle between Clemenceau and Lloyd George for the mastery. It merely juggled politically with the fate of civilization."

The world today is in political and industrial chaos. Dark clouds loom in the Orient. If England renews its pernicious alliance with Japan for the exclusive exploitation of helpless China, the consequences will be madly tragic and may plunge the whole world into a test of supremacy between Occident and Orient.

"The United States at this conference will lay its cards on the table for the universe to see. We have no lust of conquest. We want no nation's land. We want the open door in China. We want this weak nation strengthened and uplifted. We want the people educated and the natural resources developed along just and healthy lines. With 400 million there will be enough trade for all and we merely want equal opportunity for all."

"We realize the utter madness of so-called military and naval preparedness and its unpayable burden on the common people of the world. The preparedness of today may be the scrap heap, the junk pile of tomorrow. We want to get out from under this wanton waste and we wish less to fear and more ability to arm and prepare than other nations on earth want to set the example to the rest of the nations. We want open sessions. If the deliberations are honest and fair there is nothing to fear from the world. If the delegates wish to continue their old time diplomatic tricks and quibblings so much the more reason why the public should know so that we may force them back to their duty to the human race."

CHANGING PLAN OF ITS BUSINESS

HERO OF WAR TO BE HONORED

Revolutionary Character to
Be Made Subject of Memorial by Native County

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va., Oct. 5.—George Rogers Clark, conqueror of the northwest of Revolutionary days and brother of William Clark, the colleague of Meriwether Lewis in the Lewis and Clark expedition in exploring the far northwest, is to be honored in his native county of Albemarle by a memorial in bronze presenting him on horseback as the central figure of a group which soon will be placed in a park here near the entrance to the campus of the University of Virginia.

The group, the work of Robert Ingersoll Aitken, a New York sculptor whose previous masterpiece is the McKinley Monument in Golden Gate Park, San Francisco, was a gift to the University of Virginia by Paul Goodloe McIntire, a native of this city and an alumnus of the University. It epitomizes the adventure and achievement of the noted Virginian in exploring and acquiring the territory between the Mississippi and the Alleghenies known as the Northwest.

Three prominent figures in the group, Clark on horseback, is in the center and dominates the group. He is portrayed with two Indian chiefs whose distrust or enmity is shown in every feature, and especially in their poses, in which their backs are partly turned on the explorer and his Virginians. Clark's party is represented by three figures in typical hunter garb. Two of them hold their flintlocks in readiness for defense, or in threat. The third figure is posed over a barrel of powder. A young squaw, the third Indian figure, holds a baby.

George Rogers Clark was a native of Albemarle County. The site of the house in which he was born is still shown about three miles northwest of Charlottesville. It is in full view of Monticello and there are evidences in Jefferson's letters that he was acquainted with the Clark family.

Virginia, whom he so gallantly honored, was slow to acclaim George Rogers Clark. In his last years the legislature of his native state tendered him a sword. He was then living in Louisville, Ky., where his grave is now marked by a monument which is an impressive and dignified tribute
