Mrs. Stella Logie will discuss language work, after which there will be a round-table talk, led by C. E. Perry of Baker. Penmanship will be the subject handled by William L. Nollan. Other subjects will be taken up during the day and this evening the Neighborhood Club and Ad Club, assisted by the University Club of La Grande, will give a specially prepared program for the teachers in the high school building. Besides a drama of exceptional merit, there will be dancing and general get-together spirit will prevail.
