FAIR ATTENDED BY LARGE CROWD

Wallowa County Fair Was a Big Success; Many White People Attended Chief's Funeral.

JOSEPH, Oct. 11.—(Special.)—Died Tuesday, October 4, at Enterprise fair grounds, Philip McFarlane, chief of the Nez Percé Indians. Chief Philip was a frequent visitor in Wallowa county and had many warm friends among the whites. He had been here before this summer in the interests of Indian cemetery, and had returned for the fair, the Fair Association having hired the Indians to come over and assist in the entertainments. Although Philip was ill he insisted on coming anyway, but only lived one short week. The Indians were heartbroken at his death and could scarcely be induced to stay after his passing. It was at first thought to bury him on Snake river, but his family decided to place his body beside those of his two sons who died more than twenty years ago and were buried at the foot of Wallowa Lake. Saturday morning a short funeral ceremony was conducted at the grave, partly by his son, Francis McFarlane, of Kamiah, Idaho, in the Indian tongue, and then by Rev. Cullison of the M. E. church at Enterprise. As the friends and relatives gathered at the open grave to gaze for the last time on the face of their loved chief, there were many expressions of dry grief. The funeral was largely attended by white people also, out of respect for their friend Philip, of whom it was said in the obituary written by the Indians, "He always loved his white friends." He leaves a son, Francis McFarlane, a daughter, Mrs. Nora Harrison, who was also well known in Wallowa county, and a brother, David McFarlane. Joe Marks of Imnaha had the misfortune to break his leg Sunday when a wagon went over a steep grade. He and grapefruit is deteriorating in Florida due to drought.

Married, Saturday October 8, at the Baptist parsonage in Enterprise, by Rev. Patey, Elmer Butler of Joseph and Miss Zola Quinn of Divide. Both bride and groom are well known in Joseph and vicinity and have many friends who wish them a long and happy married life. They will spend their honeymoon with their respective parents and later make their home in Joseph.

Pete Wilson of Snake River, who spent fair week in the valley and took second money in the riding contest, took his family to La Grande, where his small son was to be operated on for adenoids and diseased tonsils. Mr. Wilson, who has been one of the most noted buckaroos of the northwest, has quit the wild horse game and has a flourishing ranch on Snake river. A few years ago he rode in the semi-finals at the Pendleton Round-Up.

The county fair at Enterprise was the best attended and attracted the most interest and attention of any fair in years. From the point of exhibits it was scarcely up to standard. Many reasons may be attributed to the lack of interest shown by people in preparing exhibits, such as the late harvest of last year making people eager to have the crops in early, and also the destructive freeze of September, which killed all tender vegetation and all the lovely autumn flowers. What was lacking in exhibits, however, was more than made up in sports, there being a program each afternoon lasting from one p. m. until five, and consisting of almost every sort of race. Friday and Saturday the program began with a parade by both Indians and cowboys. After the cowboys had performed the Indians gave a parade and war dance and on Friday Joe Albert, an old Indian and one of the chief men of the tribe, made a short speech. On Friday the relay race was finished and won by the Cougar creek team. There were eight strings in the running with but a matter of seconds between the first four, which made it a wonderfully exciting race. The day both Friday and Saturday was finished by a wild horse race, which was most wildly exciting from start to finish. On Saturday the bucking contest was finished and the saddle was given to "Doc" Tippets of Enterprise.

APPLE CROP LARGE, SAYS STATISTICIAN

Oregon is estimated at 75 bushels for 1921 as compared with 24.9 bushels for the United States.

The August dry weather decline in condition continued through the first half of September when killing frosts checked further potato growth in most districts. Many late planted potatoes had made but little growth of tubers when killed by frost, hence, will be very small in size. In fact, the state crop generally appears to be under average size. Urging to further advanced than usual for this date and market reports indicate that the

carloads have already been shipped.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—Crop conditions for the week ending October 1, are covered in reports received by the Bureau of Markets and Crop Estimates, United States Department of Agriculture, from its field statisticians in the different states.

Seeding Progressing.
The seeding of the winter wheat crop has continued to make rapid progress and is nearing completion in the more northern sections. Early sown fields are up to a good stand and vigorous growth is reported throughout the northern and central states. Plowing in Texas is facilitated by recent rain. Rain is needed in some sections of Utah, Idaho and Washington.

Threshing of spring wheat has been delayed somewhat by rains in North Dakota and grain still in shock is being damaged by sprouting. Threshing reports from Utah show very good yields.

The digging of the late crop of Irish potatoes is making good progress throughout the northern and central part of States. Some good yields are reported especially in the Western states, but yields elsewhere generally are poor, though of good quality. Some vines are still green and some improvement of late fields is noted due to recent favorable weather conditions. One of the best crops on record is reported in Armstrong county, Mo.; some damage from white grubs is reported in Wisconsin.

The outlook for sweet potatoes, which in general has been very favorable, is showing some depreciation recently due to the long continued drought.

Western Fruit Good.
The picking of winter varieties of apples is in progress in most sections. Good yields are reported in the far Western states, but the yield is generally poor elsewhere. A late infestation of codling moths has made many of the apples in Michigan, France, and elsewhere nearly all marketed in Idaho, and about 2,000 cars have been shipped. Shipments of grapes from California exceeded 400 cars per day during the past week. The condition of oranges and grapefruit is deteriorating in Florida due to drought.

All classes of livestock are generally in good condition. Dairy herds are being considerably reduced in the northern and northeastern counties of New York due to the hay shortage. Some hog cholera is reported in Indiana, Illinois and Kansas.

The third cutting of alfalfa is about completed in Utah and Idaho, and good yields reported. Some good crops of soy beans and cowpeas for hay are being harvested in the Southern States. New seeding of clover are making good growth in the northern and central states. Pastures are furnishing considerable feed although rain is badly needed in some sections, especially in the eastern and southern states. Ranges in the western states are generally very good.
