PRESS CONGRESS OPENED TODAY

HONOLULU, Oct. 12—Dr. Walter Williams, President of the Press Congress of the World, which opened its session here today, has received the following message from T. R. Williams, President of the American Newspaper Publishers Association: "On behalf of the American Newspaper Publishers Association, permit me to extend heartfelt greetings to the Press Congress of the World. It is a gathering from which it is impossible for anything but good to come, whereas it will be regarded in some quarters perhaps, as differing from other congresses which we all respect too highly to mention. "It is really of good omen to the people of all countries that there should be such an international conference of their respective newspaper fraternities as that which you are holding. "The press is, in every civilized land, the supreme vehicle of public opinion, and it is public opinion which ultimately governs. That the press by which the chief nations are interpreted to one another, should be internationalized in the spirit of fraternal good will, is therefore of the highest consequence to us elsewhere. "This friendly mingling of editors and publishers from widely separated lands for the purpose of better understanding and increased cooperation is the first step toward the era of worldwide good feeling for which all mankind so deeply yearns. The complete success of your meeting is the earnest wish of the newspapermen of America."

EDISON GAVE UP ONE INVENTION

NEW YORK, Oct. 12—Engineers interested in snow removal from city streets have considered perfecting a machine built forty years ago by Thomas A. Edison, but left in an experimental stage because the inventor turned his work into other fields. This machine, drawn by a horse, devoured the flakes and disgorged them in icy blocks which occupied only one-tenth the space of the fallen snow and made removal easy. In a letter from Mr. Edison, recently read at a forum on "snow removal in cities," the inventor expressed belief that a competent engineer could readily figure out an efficient means of improving and modernizing his invention.

"BOB HAMPTON OF PLACER" AT ARCADE TOMORROW

One of the most picturesque and gripping chapters of American frontier history is revived on the screen in Marshall Neilan's picture version of Randall Parrish's stirring story, "Bob Hampton of Placer," which comes to the Arcade tomorrow for a three day run.

Director Neilan is said to have employed more than 2000 Indians and soldiers to reproduce in this motion picture General Custer's gallant last stand against the Indian tribes of the far west.

James Kirkwood has the title role in this story, which is one of love and adventure, as well as battle with the red men under Sitting Bull. Wesley Barry's smiling face and uncounted trickles will also be seen in a role especially created for him by Mr. Neilan.

Marjorie Daw has the chief feminine part, and other important players are Pat O'Malley, Noah Beery, Frank Leigh, Dwight Criffielden, who portrays General Custer, Tom Gallery, Priscilla Bonner, Charles West, Bert Sprout, Carle Clark Ward, Vic Patel and Bud Post.

The scenario for "Bob Hampton of Placer," which is an Associated First National release, was prepared by Marion Fairfax.

According to advance reports, the production represents the most ambitious effort yet made by Marshall Neilan, who has to his credit several notable cinema successes of recent years. It was photographed among the scenic grandeur of Glacier National Park and on the actual site of Custer's Last Stand.

LEONARD MERRICK'S NOVEL IS A POPULAR FAVORITE.

Leonard Merrick, author of "Conrad in Quest of His Youth," could not have anticipated the success which his novel achieved. It is the development of this theme which makes "Conrad in Quest of His Youth" one of the most enjoyable pictures of a decade. It has heart appeal, its situations are dramatic and the suspense holds one as by a spell. "Conrad in Quest of His Youth" is a picture which, once seen, will not soon be forgotten.
