New Stretch of Highway Between Wallowa and Lostine Has Been Completed.

WALLOWA, Oct. 13.—(Special.)—Wallowa was represented at the County Fair held at Enterprise Friday, October 7. All the business houses were closed and everyone attended the fair. The stock exhibit was one of the interesting features of the entertainment, as the finest specimens of stock were entered from all parts of the county. The prize saddle was won by Joe Tippett, an Enterprise cowboy. Among the other things was a war dance given by the Nez Perce Indians. They participated in the parade. Visitors state that the fair was unusually good this year. There was a large crowd each day.

The teachers of the high school and the grade school left Sunday afternoon for La Grande to attend institute, which was held the first of the week. Miss Friederick Schilke, instructor of music and the commercial department in the high school, will sing Tuesday afternoon.

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K. P. ELECT THEIR OFFICERS

Grand Lodge Being Held in Portland; La Grande Woman Chosen Officer of Pythian Sisters.

PORTLAND, Oct. 13.—At the fortieth session of the grand lodge Knights of Pythias, Wednesday afternoon, the election of M. F. Hardisty of Seattle as vice grand chancellor was a close race. Hardisty is said to have won out over the local field of several candidates by one vote. He has long been known as a booster for Seattle and the Knights of Pythias. His election as grand vice chancellor puts him in line for succession to the position of grand chancellor next year.

The election of Leif S. Smith, grand vice chancellor to succeed W. J. Clark as grand chancellor, was without opposition.

Frank Grabner of Baker was elected to the third highest office, that of grand prelate.

The reelection of Walter G. Glendon as grand keeper of records and seals, and the reelection of James W. Maloney of Pendleton as grand master of exchequer, were unanimous.

Election was completed today by selection of Henry Friedlander of Portland for grand master at arms; William Smith of McMinnville, grand inner guard; J. D. Anderson of Hillsboro, grand outer guard, and placing the retiring Grand Chancellor Clark as one of the grand trustees. Installation of officers was held this afternoon.

Tuesday evening the D. O. K. K. band and brigand patrol displayed their magnificent uniforms on the streets between 7 and 8 o'clock, after which a class of nearly 100 neophytes from all parts of the state participated in the ceremony of Abi-Uh! At of Temple in the grand lodge hall of the Pythian building. Mayor George L. Baker led the candidates to the altar and fearlessly bestrode the goat. At midnight, or thereabouts, the ceremonial was closed and the entire room.
