MANY THINGS HAPPEN IN MOVIES—NOT IN THE SCRIPT

In the fight between Roy Stewart, as Bob Burton and Harry Van Meter, the villain, newest drama of Western life, "The Lone Hand" at the Star theatre Saturday and Sunday, "The Lone Hand" star unintentionally scored a real knock-out.

The two men had been fighting in a lonely desert cabin when the villain launched a final thrust. Stewart waited and an uppercut, swung from the hip, caught the villain flush in the face. Down he went, blood spouting from his nose, and although this was not in the script, the director was thoroughly satisfied. In fact all were content, with the exception of Van Meter.

STRONG CHARACTERS IN "BOB HAMPTON OF PLACER"

One of the outstanding features of Marshall Neilan's spectacular pictorialization of the Randall Parrish novel, "Bob Hampton of Placer," is said to be the striking characters of the story depicted on the screen by one of the most popular casts ever assembled in a Neilan film.

Wesley "Freckles" Barry, as a bow-legged youngster of the plains, overladen with regalia of the cowboy and a worshipping partner to "Bob," is a character unknown to the readers of the book, for it has been introduced into the film by Mr. Neilan with the purpose of lightening up the heavy dramatic trend of the story.

On his closely cropped head Wesley carries the "scars" of a mule-hoof and other marks of former conflicts with four-footed animals that he had hoped to tame.

Other important parts that are expected to help make this film particularly notable for his remarkable characters are those of Lieut. Grant, by Pat O'Malley; the historical General Custer, by Dwight Crittenden; the Rev. Wyncoop, by Tom Gallery; the young school teacher by Priscilla Banner; the sheriff, by Bert Sprout; the housekeeper, by Carole Clark Ward; the lean William McNeil—one of the biggest liars at the fort—by Vic Fotel; and the retentive Jack Moffat—second only as an expert liar—by Budde Post.
