SLEUTHING IS PASTOR'S JOY

New York Divine Snoops Around and Locates Narcotic Drug Law Violators

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—Due to the voluntary work of a wealthy New Yorker, known to the police department as "X. Blane," New York has become an international clearing house for police information concerning the illicit traffic in narcotics. This information, furnished with an account of the work done by "X. Blane," in Europe, which he has just returned, has been made public by Special Deputy Police Commissioner Carlton Simon.

Commissioner Simon, who also serves without pay as head of the narcotics division of the police department, said that "X. Blane," working as his European assistant, had secured the cooperation of Holland, Belgium and France in a determined effort to stamp out the contraband traffic.

To this end, he announced, authorities in Paris, London and Brussels have arranged to send all information relating to drug and drug addiction to New York, and to keep the department here advised of intended shipments of contraband to this and other countries.

Commissioner Simon said that "X. Blane" reported alarming increases in drug addiction in all European countries except Germany, manufactures much of narcotics shipped here.

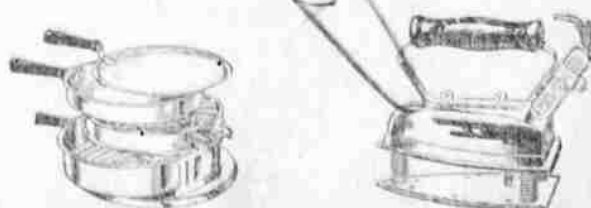
