UNCLE SAM TO CUT EXPENSES TO THE BONE

Secretary Mellon States That Expenditures Will be Kept Within Limits.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Federal expenditures for the current fiscal year will be kept within the agreed limit of \$4,034,000,000, Secretary Mellon declared tonight in a statement denying reports that an additional sum of \$370,000,000 would be asked. The programme limiting expenditures to the above figure, which had the sanction of the president and the house ways and means committee, is being carried out satisfactorily, according to the statement.

The original programme made allowance for estimated deficiency appropriations, which "it was realized would be necessary in connection with certain government activities," Mr. Mellon explained. These included particularly the settlements with the railroads, growing out of federal control and vocational training for the ex-service men, but Mr. Mellon added that his information indicated the revenue requirements of the government still would be amply provided in the \$4,034,000,000.

Some Students Are Working Their Way Through O. A. C.

CORVALLIS, Oct. 15.—Sweet apple cider—2000 cans of it—will be available at the "Hort" show November 4 and 5, to be put on at the men's gymnasium. The horticultural products section, under Professor E. H. Wiegand, is now extracting, centrifuging, canning, and sterilizing the apple juice. Apples used are selected calls, free from worm and rot, all obtained from the Oregon Grower's association by the extension service. A special label will be "on" the cans sold at the "Hort" show and a price of fifteen cents a can containing approximately a quart, has been fixed.
