Specialists from the Oregon Agricultural college, local farmers and representatives of various statewide institutions and associations interested in various phases of agriculture and home economics will take part in the programs which are even now being mapped out in general by county agricultural agents, home demonstrations and county club leaders.

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 17.—Buried in his canoe and with his steel bow strapped to his body, the remains of an Indian chief were uncovered by the wind at Wallula, Wash., 30 miles from here this morning. The shallow grave was directly back of the present site of the Wallula hotel, which has been built for more than 40 years, and pioneers assert that the grave is at least 60 years old, as Indians stopped burying their dead in this district about that time. The body was in almost a perfect state of mummified condition and vermillion was moved to sing a few lively airs.
