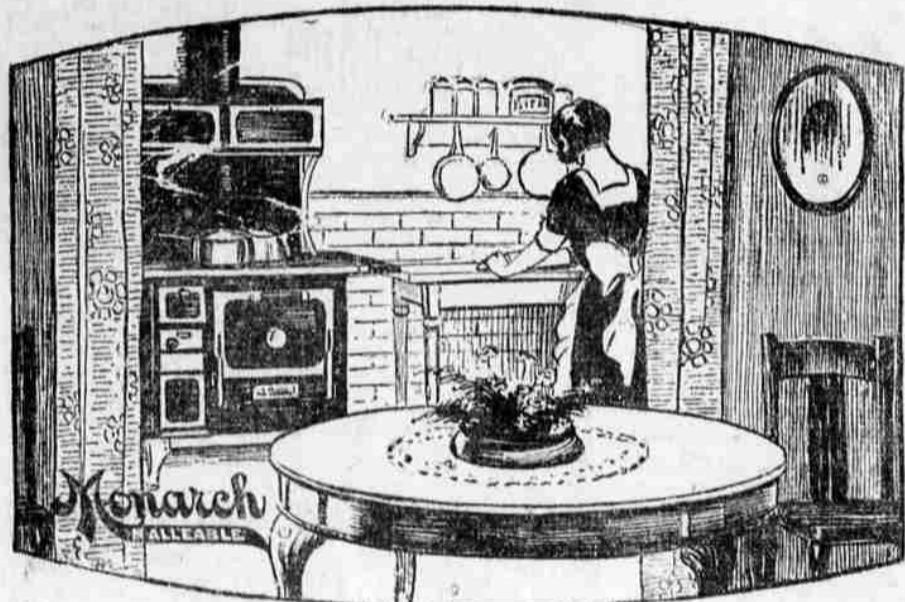

OWNER'S DON'T OWN PAPERS

So Says Missionian to the Publishers of the World Assembled in Honolulu.

HONOLULU, T. H., Oct. 17.—A newspaper does not belong to its owner, William Southern, Jr., owner of the Independence, Mo., Examiner, told the Press Congress of the World, in session here, last week in the course of a speech on the "The Provincial Press."

"A newspaper is a public institution, and is not fulfilling its highest functions if devoted selfishly. As a fundamental principle, it is agreed that the truth is the basis of all correct journalism. To go beyond the truth is a betrayal of trust. To suppress the truth when it properly belongs to the public is always to be condemned and never practiced."

"Control of news or comment for business considerations is unworthy. News should be written and interpreted wholly and at all times in the interest of the public."

"Not only are these principles to be applied to the news and editorials, but to the advertising columns. Deceptive or misleading advertisements or advertising disguised as news brings discredit to the newspapers which permit such tactics."

"It was a noted Frenchman who wrote 'Suffer yourself to be blamed, imprisoned, condemned; suffer yourself even to be hanged, but publish your opinion. It is not right, it is a duty.'"

Small town newspapers, Mr. Southern told his audience, have come nearer formulating a set of ideals of the newspaper profession into a code of ethics than has any other section of the newspaper world.

"These declarations have so far only come from the provincial papers but have received the strong endorsement of the larger papers and world-wide comment and approval."

"The highest art in the newspaper business," Mr. Southern declared, "is to give the readers what they should have in such a way that they will think it is exactly what they want."

COAL MEN ASK FOR A BIG CUT IN FREIGHT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—The American Wholesale Coal association through its president, W. R. Coyle, of Bethlehem, Pa., sent a telegram Saturday to the Association of Railroad Executives, recommending a sharp cut in rates on coal and coke accompanied, if necessary, by a further reduction in wages.

"The people are impatient over the delay in adjusting rates," the telegram said. "We recommend that you announce at once a sweeping downward revision of the rates on all coal and coke. If necessary, we recommend that you announce a further reduction in wages to take effect simultaneously with the new rate schedule."

STANDARD OIL GETS ANOTHER MONOPLY IN OIL

BERLIN, Oct. 18.—The Standard Oil company has been granted a virtual monopoly of the petroleum business in Czechoslovakia on condition that a company with a capital of 100,000,000 Czech kronen be formed, 30 per cent of the stock to be given to the Czech government and 20 per cent to be given to Prague interests and the parent company to invest 50,000,000 kronen additional in boring and prospecting within five years, according to a dispatch to the Vossische Zeitung.

It is declared also that independent American companies must abandon operations. The Czechoslovak refineries are protesting that the concession not only gives the Standard Oil company a monopoly of petroleum but also of subsidiary business.
