RAIL BOARD SUMMONS THE UNION CHIEFS

against is the decision of the railroad labor board authorizing the reduction of 12 per cent in wages which the railroads put into effect July 1. There is at present no other possible ground for a strike by the railway labor brotherhoods," said the statement issued by the railroad heads.

Government Defied.
"The labor board was created by the transportation act passed by congress in 1920 which delegated to it the duty in case of disputes, of determining reasonable wages and working conditions. The wage reduction put into effect July 1 was authorized by the board under the provision of this act. Therefore the strike which has been ordered, will be, if it occurs, a strike against a decision made by a government body acting in accordance with a federal law."

Harmony Vanishing.
CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—Whether the big four brotherhoods and the switchmen's union will be joined by the more than one million members of other unions in the proposed rail strike remained Monday night an undecided question, with indications that the final decision, expected at meetings to be held here this week, would come only after a vigorous fight in which leaders of at least a few of the organizations will make a determined effort to block a strike call.
Official calls for a meeting here Wednesday of the shop crafts executive council and for the maintenance of way divisions were sent out Monday, but it is not considered likely that the strike attitude of the organizations will be known that day, according to R. M. Jewell, president of the railway employees department, American Federation of Labor, which comprises the four hundred seventy-six thousand men in the shop crafts.

calmly folded, Dr. Brumfield yesterday afternoon spoke to the jury, telling of his loss of memory from the time he was on the Meredith ranch until while picking up BB shots, he had flashes of memory. He told of being with a stranger whom he first met in a Portland restaurant and of going with him on a train to Canada.

He saw a newspaper with the names of Brumfield and Russell and was put off a train at Blaine because the immigration officer said no more laborers were needed. The stranger took him to a hotel. He got to Vancouver and saw his picture in the papers and it frightened him. "But after a while I realized that the picture was not me but Dennis Russell," he declared.

Prior to his lapse of memory Brumfield said he had short blank periods, moods and could start to fill patients' teeth, he would get the cavity ready and the next thing he knew the tooth would be filled.

He denied that he visited a Vancouver steamship office or wrote a letter regarding Australia. "I realized I was slipping mentally," Brumfield declared.

"Did you tell anyone?" he was asked.

"No, I was afraid to tell."

"Why?"

"I did not want to be sent to an insane asylum."

"How did you know you were suffering from mental derangement?" was the next question put to him.

"I was suffering from any mental derangement," the dentist snapped back.

BUDGET BEING PREPARED NOW

First Meeting of Committee Will be Held on Thursday Evening of this Week

The budget committee of the city will meet Thursday evening for the purpose of considering the budget City Manager George Garrett is preparing. The committee was to meet last evening but it was impossible to have all the data at hand and the meeting was therefore postponed.

The budget committee consists of William Miller, J. E. Foley, and F. L. Meyers, representing the taxpayers and W. D. Grandy, president of the city commission, and Commissioners J. D. McKennon and David I. Stoddard.

EXAMINATIONS WILL BE HERE

Eligibles for Appointment to Annapolis and West Point This Month

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—Civil service examinations to secure eligibles for three appointments at the United States naval academy at Annapolis and one at the military academy at West Point are to be held at seven points in representative States' districts, on October 29. Although announcement was made some time ago only a few prospective applicants have so far appeared, and he hopes to hear from other young men of the district who have ambitions to become naval or military officers.

For each appointment a principal and two alternates will be certified the alternates moving up if the principal for any reason fails to finally qualify, as often is the case, so there is room for 15 eligibles in all, from whom the final selection of four will be made.

The examinations will be held at Pendleton, La Grande, The Dalles, Baker, Bend, Ontario and Klamath Falls. Successful applicants will enter next year's class after passing the official physical tests next February and March. Particulars can be had from Mr. Simmitt or the local civil service officials.
