AT SHERRY'S TODAY AND TOMORROW

If the Queen of Sheba should drop into the Sherry's Theatre this week she'd probably turn with jealousy, she'd probably turn with jealousy, thrilled, most of all picture we remember seeing in many moons, and in the big scene she wears a gown made of beads, or something, that fairly out-Shebas Sheba. The picture is "Sins of Rosanna," and Miss Clayton is costumed to represent the famous queen at a lawn fete held in Kimberley, near the famous diamond mines. Up to this time, according to the story, she has been playing the role of a sort of feminine Jekyll and Hyde—outwardly the pretty, but otherwise quite ordinary daughter of an English widow; but inwardly torn with a mad craving for bright stones which she received from a native Malay witch doctor when she was an infant. The result is a story of thrills, mystery, and, in the end, love. The plot is novel, but Miss Clayton's earnest interpretation of this fascinating heroine makes her strange experience seem real. Jack Hoyt is excellent in the leading male role, and Fred Malatesta is a suave, Machiavellian villain. Tom Forman directed the picture, which is a Paramount, adapted from a novelette by Cynthia Stockey.

A DIFFERENT TYPE OF STORY OFFERED A brilliant story from the pen of Clara Louise Burnham, adopted for the screen by Doris Schroeder, produced by Universal under the direction of William Worthington, and with an exceptional cast starring the fascinating Edith Roberts, is the promise to patrons of the Arcade Theatre on Wednesday only when "Opened Shutters" will be revealed on the screen. There has been a tendency of late for motion picture producers to de-
