STRIKE NOW SEEMS MORE UNCERTAIN

Tuesday night from Washington, where he and other members of the public group conferred with President Harding.

"It is the desire of elements of the board to do everything possible to prevent a strike," he said after a conference with board members. "What the procedure will be on Thursday I cannot say. It is safe to assume every possibility of averting a walkout will be taken up, and it is our hope that the two parties can be brought together on some basis looking toward settlement."

Mr. Hooper refused to say whether the board regarded the conference summons as an investigation of a threatened violation of the board's orders. It was pointed out, however, that there would be no violation of the board's July 1 wage reduction order until the men walked out.

By coincidence, the first hearing at which any party has been cited to appear because the board believed it to have violated a decision, is set for the same day as the conference, 10 a. m., Thursday. The Pennsylvania has been ordered to appear then because it has not held an election of shop men's representative as directed by the board.

DES MOINES, Oct. 19.—Attention was concentrated on the freight rate problem by middle western states governors and public officials who met here Tuesday at the call of Governor N. E. Kendall of Iowa to consider means of reviving agriculture and business, and diminishing unemployment.

It was agreed that present transportation charges made profitable farming impossible. Resolutions expressing this view and urging the necessity of speedy action by the interstate commerce commission on the pending western hay and grain rate case were prepared, but action on them was held over until Wednesday.

Attempt Made to Wreck American Embassy at Paris

Communists Make Threats Against American Embassy Because of Conviction of Murderers.

PARIS, Oct. 19.—Bombs exploded today in the house of Myron T. Herick, American ambassador, seriously injuring one of the household employees who opened the package containing the bomb. The room in which the explosion occurred was wrecked. Herick arrived at his house two minutes after the bomb exploded.

PARIS, Oct. 19.—Threats to tear down the American flag over the American Embassy here are contained in many letters protesting against conviction in the United States of two Italians for the murder of the paymaster of a shoe factory at Braintree, Massachusetts.

There have been numerous demonstrations by radical elements in Italy over the case and communist newspapers in Paris took up the campaign, urging their followers to protest the embassy.
