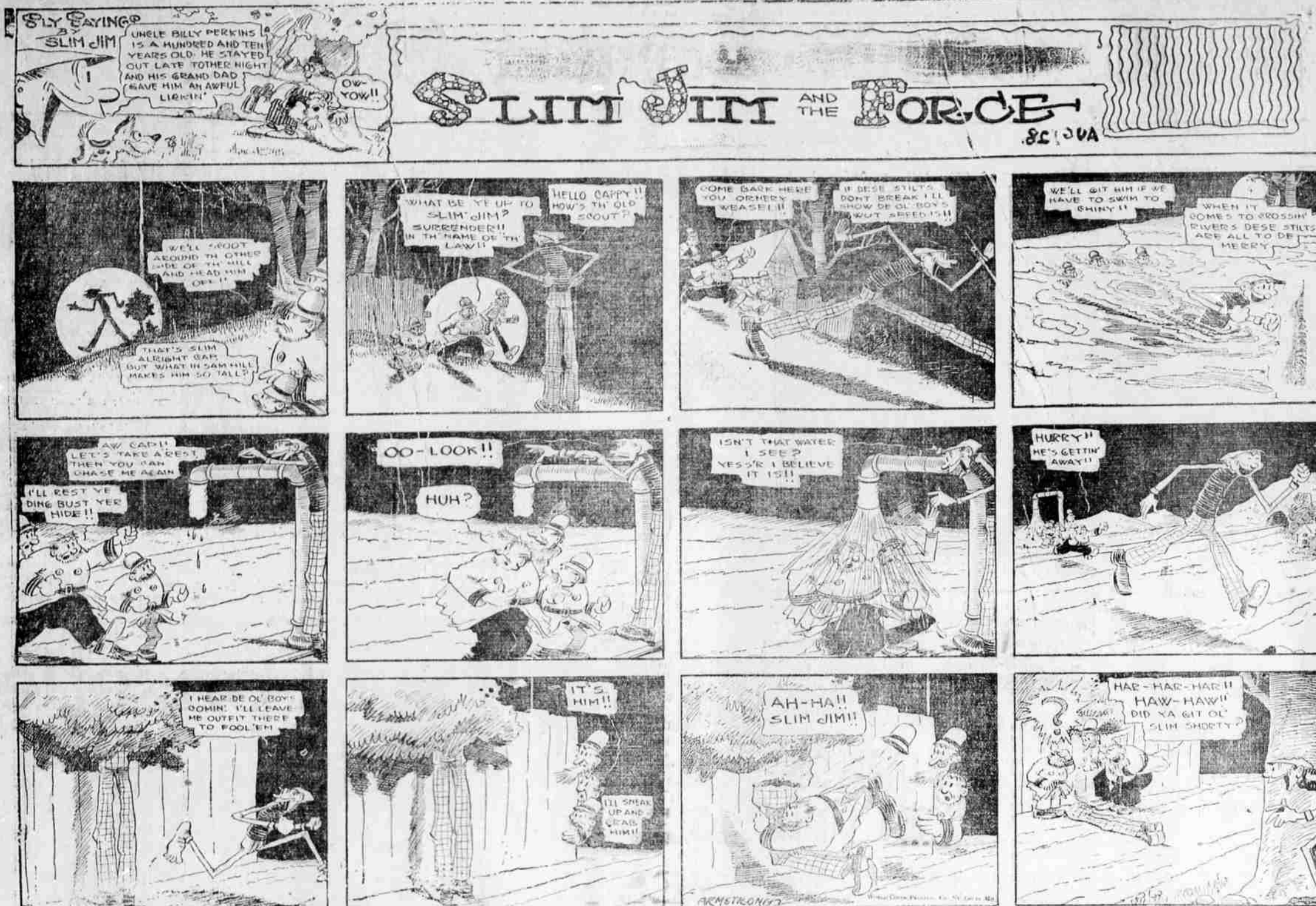




Sleeveless
