SEED CORN NEEDS DRYING.

Much immature corn has resulted from the early September frosts, the O. A. C. Experiment station has found, and there is likely to be a serious shortage of seed next spring unless it is dried out and properly stored. Seed corn is best dried in a warm, well ventilated place as rapidly as possible. It may be safely dried at 150 degrees F. in hop or prune driers although for corn with a large amount of moisture 140 degrees with a little longer time is preferable. Small lots of corn should be hung up by the husks so that the ears do not touch each other and cause faulty drying. If no better method presents itself, the corn may be hung near a stove for a few days. Once thoroughly dried, it may remain in storage safely all winter.

CONDITIONING SOWS.

Breed sows should be put in good vigorous condition before breeding. Experiments show that larger litters may be expected when sows are in good flesh and gaining at breeding time. Grain and pasture, either rape, alfalfa, clover, or green grain, make a good combination for fitting them out.

SELECTION OF STOCK.

Selection of breeding stock from a flock of hens on the basis of annual trap nest records, regardless of tested breeding qualities, is a certain method of increasing egg production, according to a bulletin just issued by the poultry department of the O. A. C. Experiment station. That high fecundity or laying ability is inherited has been established beyond question.—Poultry Husbandry.

It is good farm practice to see that all farm implements, such as cultivators and tools are in the dry. Unpainted parts of discs and plows should be well smeared with oil or grease to prevent rusting. Every implement should be gone over systematically to tighten nuts, adjust bearings, and replace worn or broken parts.—O. A. Experiment station.
