Lycum Course Opens Friday Evening of this week; Ticket Sale Began.

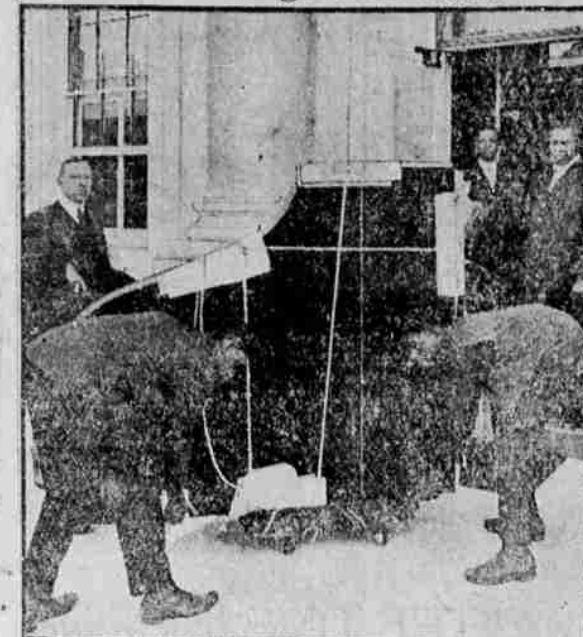
La Grands winter lycum course opens next Friday evening when the united committee representing the schools, all churches, the Neighborhood Club and the Ad Club, present Charles Crawford Ghost, famed bird imitator and naturalist.

Various committees met this morning and are placing season tickets today and tomorrow in order that all may get advantage of the special rates for the season.

In regard to the opening number Chairman A. C. Hampton said this morning:

"For many years Mr. Gort has made birds his study. SAN ANTONIO, Texas, Oct. 24.—The first freight train to run over the International & Great Northern line since the trainmen walked out Saturday arrived from Taylor Saturday night. It was manned by recruits. Road officials said that service would be expanded Monday. Two switch engines at the local yard of the road were put back into service Sunday.

HOUSTON, Texas, Oct. 24.—Three freight trains were operated on the International & Great Northern system Sunday, General Manager G. E. Goforth announced Sunday night. This follows a complete tie-up of freight service Saturday by the strike of approximately 650 union trainmen.

Union officials declared they had adopted a policy of "hands off" and would not interfere with any move the company might make to resume service.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24.—Regulations permitting the manufacture and prescription of beer and wine for the sick will be issued by the treasury department. Secretary Mellon announced today. They are drawn in accordance with the interpretation of the law by former Attorney General Palmer. They will make a case of beer a unit for prescriptions of that beverage, with no limit to the number of prescriptions physicians may issue. The wine prescriptions will be for two quarts at a time with no limit to the number of prescriptions.
