Beef Business Better.
"I would be surprised if the beef cattle industry would die out," dolefully commented Water M. Pierce of Union county. "I wonder if beef is really a necessary part of diet? During and since the war there has been a great change in the diet of Americans. There is an increased consumption of chickens, oysters, vegetables, veal and rabbits, due largely to Mr. Hoover's telling the people during the war to eat less meat, so that more meat could be sent to the soldiers. Then, too, the consumption of beef, per capita, has shown a remarkable decrease. Beef cattle may not be the necessity which we have supposed. In France rabbits are largely used; the soldier boys say they saw the rabbits everywhere. I am particularly interested in beef cattle, for it has been my business raising them and preparing them for market. The cattle business is in a bad way throughout the nation," Oregonian.
