CONDITIONS OF CROPS GOOD

Seeding of Winter Wheat Has Been Finished in Many States and Stock in Good Shape.

Crop conditions for the half month ending October 15, are covered in reports received by the Bureau of Markets and Crop Estimates, United States Department of Agriculture, from its field statisticians in the different states.

Corn husking is making good progress throughout the northern and central states, and large yield of good quality are generally reported. Considerable damage from the corn ear worm, mold and rot is reported in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois and the corn ear worm, mold and rot is reported in Ohio, Indiana and Illinois and the corn ear worm is also reported to be very prevalent in Michigan and Wisconsin. The yield will probably be below expectations in Nebraska, but is generally fair to good except in the drought sections. The late crop in the southern states is nearly fully matured and harvesting is in full progress. The yield of the late crop is good in most practically completed in the northern sections of the south.

The seeding of winter rye is nearing completion. Early sown fields are showing good stands of excellent color.

Cotton picking has made rapid progress and is practically completed in many sections. The yield has generally been small and weevil damage severe. Much of the crop has already been ginned.

Potato digging has made good progress and is nearing completion in some sections. The yield is quite variable, but generally small. The tubers are usually of fair size and the quality good. Very little disease is reported from any section, but grub worms are continuing to cause damage in Wisconsin. Frosts have killed the vines in some districts of the far western states which will hasten the maturity of the crop.

The harvesting of sweet potatoes continues. The production has been cut somewhat by drought but the quality is excellent.

Apple picking is practically finished in the central states with a very small yield reported. Picking continues in the far western states under favorable weather conditions. The yield in the western states is generally reported as good and the fruit is of excellent color and size. Prunes in Oregon have

been harvested with very little rain damage reported.

All classes of live stock are in good condition with the exception of some sections where the grazing is poor due to drought. Hog cholera is causing considerable loss in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Kansas and Iowa.

New seedings of clover are showing good growth and are recovering from the long summer drought. Pastures have been benefited by recent rains and are furnishing considerable feed in most sections, but are being injured considerably by drought in New York and the southeastern section of the country.

WEST LUMBER CUT INCREASED

While Cut in Entire U. S. Dropped, Production in West Kept Climbing.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25.—The lumber cut of the United States in 1920 was 23,798,800,000 feet, which is 2.2 per cent less than in 1919, and 27 per cent less than the peak in 1907.

The average price of lumber at the mill increased to \$38.42 per thousand, which is a rise of 150 per cent since 1910. The aggregate value of the cut is \$1,269,000,000. These are the highest annual valuations ever recorded, but do not indicate present conditions. They merely reflect the extremely high peak in the post-war lumber prices

which was passed in the first quarter of 1920.

These are the principal statistics obtained by the Forest Service, United States Department of Agriculture, in its 1920 canvass of American saw-mills. They are based upon reports from 15,978 active mills out of 23,243 estimated to have been in operation. Several thousand mills cutting less than 50,000 feet were not tabulated, though allowance was made for their cut. Comparisons with 1919 are published by permission of the Bureau

of the Census, United States Department of Commerce.

The tables show that the states which increased their cut are all in the Pacific Coast group and the Rocky Mountains. Washington is first, as usual. Oregon attains second place for the first time, displacing Louisiana from a position held for 15 years, while California takes rank among the first five, displacing another southern yellow pine state.

In 1920 the Pacific and Rocky Mountain groups of States, combined,

produced 35.6 per cent of the cut. The eight states of the southern pine group amounted to 15 per cent. The conditions reported by southern operators, arising directly or indirectly from the World War, were so adverse that the southern pine may be expected to recover part of the lost ground during the next few years. But the indications of the statistics are that the amount of southern yellow pine cut, in 1919 was less than 60 per cent of the amount of southern yellow pine cut, in 1920 became 83 per cent. This supremacy in lumber production held relative increase in the western species arises in part from the decrease the zenith and is moving to the west.
