SCHOOL EXPENSE IS CONSIDERED

Budget Committee, Under New Law, Met With the School Board Last Evening.

This is budget season, and according to a law passed by the last session of the state legislature, it is necessary for a committee of citizens to sit with every tax levying body of every political unit of the state.

Last evening the school board of District No. 1 met with the following citizens as a budget committee to go over the expenditures of the city schools: James Garrity, S. D. Crowe, Elmer Stoddard, C. E. Short and Bruce Dennis. Members of the school board present were J. E. Reynolds, A. T. Hill, J. A. Russell, Colon R. Eberhard, C. J. Black, Superintendent A. C. Hampton and Clerk Charles Reynolds were also in attendance.

The meeting was organized by electing J. A. Russell chairman and Bruce Dennis secretary, after which the budget of expenses was read.

It was discovered that the law on school budget committees had tripped itself up in a measure because the committee last evening was asked to pass on a year's business which has been more than half completed; to pass on salaries of teachers and other employees who have been under contract with the board for six months; to pass on supplies which have in the main been purchased and to a great extent consumed.

This was no fault of the school board, but it is admitted that it is a decided defect in the law and should be remedied in some manner.

The expenditures reviewed last night, while enormous and show constant mounting up of school expense, could not be reduced according to the judgment of the committee. None favored a reduction in teachers' salaries at present, and a reduction could not be made any way for the teachers are under contract for the school year.

If the schools are to be kept in the accredited class along with Baker, Pendleton, Salem and Astoria, it was plain that reduction in expenses is not to be encountered very soon. It was admitted that if Domestic Science, Manual Training and other fanciful educational departments are to be retained, the taxpayer must pay for each thing and he is not likely to find much relief in his school tax burden.

But the general opinion of both the committee and the school board was that the new law should give the committee a chance to meet with the school board prior to entering the year's school business so that the opinions of all may be considered. By unanimous action the budget for the present working school year, of which there is almost a half finished, was endorsed by the budget committee.
