Religion But Three Weeks Old Already Has Entered Commerce.
 TOKIO, Oct. 28.—Japan's newest religion is the Reiki-gaku, or "Soul Intellect Knowledge" sect, which arose recently in the neighborhood of Yokosuka and now, a few months after its foundation, owns and operates a fleet of merchant ships plying out of Kobe to China ports. The shipping company launched by the new sect is the Tenka Yoko, a few weeks old, but already said to be a competitor in the China trade that is worrying the Nippon Yusen Kaisha.
 The God of Yokosuka, as the founder of this sect is called, was until a few brief months ago Watanabe who worked in the Yokosuka Naval Arsenal in the humble capacity of clerk. Not long since he launched out in the role of preacher and prophet of the Reiki-gaku religion preaching a doctrine of virtue without regard to worldly gain said to have been the result of long years of intensified meditation. Soon he found himself at the head of a large number of ardent disciples and his "church" possessed a large and swelling income.
 He has written a volume called "The Light of Divine Intellect." Like Omoto-kyo the Reiki-gaku has attracted many naval and military men into its ranks, naval men especially since there are many in the region of Yokosuka where there is a great naval base. According to the Japanese newspapers the Reiki-gaku adherents are placing implicit confidence in their leader in his financial ventures as well as in his spiritual leaderships.
