QUEENSTOWN, Nov. 1.—(By Mail).—The Celtic entourage to San Francisco, Monsignor Rogers said he had made arrangements to ship ten thousand pounds sterling worth of Campanara marble to San Francisco to be used to decorate the sanctuary in the Catholic cathedral of that city. TEN MANY OFFICERS.
MEXICO CITY, Mex., Nov. 1.—There are already too many general and colonels in the Mexican army and for that reason President Obregon has refused to reinstate into the federal army numerous officers of the old army who petitioned that they be given active commands at their own grades.

NO INCREASE OF DELINQUENCY

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 1.—Juvenile delinquency is not increasing, George J. Schon of Louisville, chairman of the American Prison Association's committee on juvenile delinquency, told the association here tonight.

Mr. Schon said that a majority of his committee of 60 held the same view and that it was supported by statistics from authorities in leading cities throughout the country. He said his broader knowledge of the situation gained as chairman of the committee had led him to this conclusion, namely, when appointed he firmly believed juvenile delinquency to be growing.

The chief cause of juvenile delinquency today, according to an overwhelming majority of the committee, Mr. Schon reported, is a breaking down of parental responsibility.

"I am firmly convinced," he added, "that there must be an immediate resumption of that responsibility and that on the part of mothers and those who will become the mothers of the children of this nation—or there will be an alarming, unconquerable increase in juvenile delinquency."

Of the movies, Mr. Schon said, "There can be no denial of the harmful influence of scenes too often depicted on the screen. Court records almost without number trace juvenile crime directly to this source."

"There seems to be no divided opinion as to the necessity for suppression, through careful censorship or by more drastic means, of this prolific source of depraved thought and criminal action on the part of the young."

"The press of the land," he added, "is another agency which should give us concern in our quest for the causes of transgressions by those of tender years and immature minds. There can be no question that the origin of a portion of juvenile delinquency is located in the columns of the daily press."

"The committee has found the administration of the criminal law of the land another source from which springs juvenile delinquency. Recent years have witnessed a tendency to ward's infrequency of conviction for criminal acts, and at the same time a tendency to minimize the punishment of the criminal in those cases where conviction is secured."
