

HALLOWE'EN WAS A NOISY NIGHT

Union Showed Lots of Signs of Life Monday But Has Recovered.

UNION, Nov. 2.—(Special)—The Oregon Journal said yesterday that the spirit of Halloween is dead. They ought to have seen Main street in Union. One rather dainty Ford touring car was in an inverted position resting on its headquarters, so to speak, two hay racks were vying for the most space on two opposite sidewalks, and then, to cap the climax, a mirth-inspiring mural decoration adorned the middle of the road leading under the misapplied appellation of the "Police Department." Needless to say the street was soon put in ship-shape order and at present all well. Outside of the above mentioned disorders very little mischief of any serious nature was perpetrated in Union.

Several dances, parties and similar fetes were held Halloween. The Union Dancing Club held a club dance at Tony D. Smith's Hall beginning at seven-thirty and closing at ten. After the young people adjourned from the dance they went to the Bakery and partook of refreshments ranging from stolen peanuts to apple cider and pumpkin pie.

A party was held at the M. E. church given by the Epworth League. Everyone reported a splendid time despite the spooky games played. Band practice went on undisturbed during all the ruckus but no one knows where the members went after the rehearsal was dismissed.

The program for Armistice Day celebration in Union is practically complete now. It is being superintended by the American Legion and the present plans are as follows: Parade in the morning led by the Union Concert Band, some speaking and fitting ceremonies after the parade, a big double-header football clash between the high school teams of Imbler and Union and between the Union and North Powder Legion teams. After the game nothing occurs until evening. The Union Concert Band will give a concert at the Hotel Union, after which a dance will be held at Smith's Hall. A good time is guaranteed to all. The present outlook points towards a heavy crushing team well versed in football to represent the Union American Legion post. North Powder will have to step some if she carries away the honors. And Imbler should be a set-up for Union unless the unforeseen occurs.

Several of the young people attended the traveling men's dance given at the Union Hotel Saturday evening.
