ISLAND CITY ENTERTAINS

Residents of Island City district dined at the Community church in Island City last evening and listened to some excellent speeches and sang old familiar songs. Twenty-five of the 100 plates had been reserved for members of the Union County All club and special speakers. The reservation included space for Dr. Murphy's "Pop" committee. The La Grande singers, led by Elmer Stoddard, introduced some new melodies and got the rest of the audience into a singing mood.

A., in La Grande explained in detail the plan of four-fold development of boys—urging fathers to see their boys trained along educational, physical, religious and service lines. Rev. Geo. H. Quigley, pastor of the M. E. church, indulged in some humorous personalities and interspersed them with some soberer thoughts.

Rev. A. R. Sisson of the La Grande Baptist church spoke on the recent association of all Union county pastors and ministers.

Rev. Leitch the sky pilot of Island City, and the director of the banquet, gave the diners the outlook for boys of Island City for the winter. Chairman Kiddle then threw the meeting open to general discussion of community matters, and out of this grew a movement to clean up the old debt on the Island church. Andrew Blochland, Ira Kennedy and others talked informally.

The meeting was a decided success. Not least among the features that pleased the guests from La Grande was the wonderful dinner served by the Island City ladies. A note of sadness fell like a cloud upon the gathering at the mention of the late E. E. Kiddle who presided at the last similar gathering in Island City.

As a community and inter-community affair it was well worth the effort.

Considerable amount of new business is gradually being disposed of. "It is expected that the bank will be enabled to take care of some new business gradually and systematically, but not all that will be offered, even of desirable risks. An applicant must be qualified as a real farmer, whose principal business is farming, and loans can be considered only for actual necessary agricultural purposes.

"A ready and favorable market has been found for the recent offering of federal land bank bonds, from the sale of which funds are derived with which to make loans. All bonds sold by the land banks since the supreme court passed on the constitutionality of the farm loan act have been sold to the investing public on the open market. Some persons write as if they believe the government is furnishing funds to make loans, but it is not. The land banks do a commercial business, borrowing money from the persons to whom it sells the bonds, and loaning the same money to the farmers at a slightly increased rate."

HERO OF WAR IS GRANTED HONOR

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 5.—Sergeant Samuel Woodfill, selected by General Pershing as the greatest war hero of all, was presented to President Harding today and congratulated by the chief executive on his war record.

Sergeant Woodfill was brought to the White House by Senator Ernst of Kentucky, in whose state he is now stationed.

Sergeant Woodfill later was accorded an unusual reception by the house.

The sergeant, sitting alone in the members' gallery, arose, saluted and then bowed as he was introduced to the house by Representative Benjamin of Indiana, in whose district he was born and where he was known in his boyhood days as "the Bellevue scrapper."
