EGYPT REVIVING ITS COMMERCE

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 7.—Signs of commercial revival are seen by business and shipping communities in

Egypt. After months of depression, they say, there has come a healthier tone of confidence and optimism which is most encouraging. The feeling prevails among the business interests that the late fall will see the country back to normal and healthy trade.

The Egyptian public is wearying of the discussions of the country's future political status and is showing

far more interest in the price of cotton which is the barometer of commercial activity.

Throughout the spring and summer, the large hold-over from last year's cotton crop acted as a damper on the business community which feared a further restriction of the Egyptian's purchasing capacity. Efforts have been made to relieve that situation. Prominent groups of

Egyptian cotton growers have visited England and told the cotton spinners of Manchester that Egypt will not continue to grow cotton for unremunerative prices.

The Egyptian government has officially restricted the area of cotton cultivation, and as a result, this season's crop has suffered this year more severely than usual from the boll weevil.

Owing in part to these reasons and in part to the rise in American cot-

ton, the Egyptian crop nearly doubled in price. Consequently, optimism prevails among the growers and shippers.

Taxes amounting to \$130,927.27, or 17 per cent of the 1920 tax roll, remain uncollected in Baker county.
