

Paper Mill Has Been Put Into College

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Nov. 8.—A paper mill, valued at ten thousand dollars has been installed in the forestry building for use of the forestry students. Though miniature in size, it is complete in every detail and capable of turning out paper of any quality or size demanded. The mill is to be used in connection with courses in wood technology and is expected to be an interesting feature of the annual engineering show next spring. F. W. Leadbetter of the Oregon Pulp and Paper company of Salem was instrumental in placing this equipment in the school of forestry.
