ENGLAND MAKING RAPID STRIDES

Conserving Fuel After Having Been Shown During War What Could be Done

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—England has taken advantage of economies brought to light under world war necessities, has abolished obsolete heat standards and is making great strides in conservation of coal and oil for her people. Alfred J. Phillips of New York, gas engineer of the American Gas Association, who has just returned from an investigation trip to the British Isles, told the managing committee of its sessions held today just previous to the opening of the annual convention of the Association tomorrow.

"England learned during the war that a great portion of the heat in gas went into the atmosphere a sheer waste," Mr. Phillips said. "The result is that fixed standards of heat have been abolished. Instead the gas company declares the calorific value of the gas it intends to deliver and the household or industrial user pays on that basis. Waste, either in production or in the money the user pays, is reduced to the minimum.

"The effect will be far reaching. Developments in manufacture are being made which are impossible under our cumbersome, obsolete and unscientific restrictions. Several single stage processes for completely gaseifying coal have been developed. Steaming of retorts is a proved success in England. With either of these processes a low heating value gas is produced. On the other hand, a few companies in England, because of special local conditions, find it economical to produce gas of 500 to 550 British Thermal Units. This is a high heat value for England though comparatively low for this country.

"Prior to the war, the heating value standards of England were practically the same as in this country. England made its discovery regarding heat values, when under war pressure it became necessary to extract certain constituents for the manufacture of picric acid, T. N. T. and other explosives, which brought about a material reduction in heating standards. In this respect Lord Moulton says that the materials furnished by the English gasworks saved the Allies from defeat in the early days of the war. As the war went on the quality of coal deteriorated, gas oil became difficult to obtain, transportation difficulties increased and because of lack of new coal materials to make repairs, plants were in no condition to operate with the efficiency formerly obtained. Further reductions in heating value became imperative.

"During the railroad and mineral strikes following the war, standards of 450 British thermal units and even lower were fixed by the Board of Trade under the provisions of the Fuel Act, Mr. Phillips said.

"Until American standards made more modern and inflexible regulations came away with," he continued, "any considerable progress will be prevented." "The gas industry in the United States should have far more liberty to develop and adopt new and improved manufacturing processes such as will result in economy in the best interests of the people as well as conserving resources affected and fuel resources conserved.

OUTLOOK IS AVERAGE FOR WHEAT CROP

seen such adverse agricultural conditions as have prevailed during the usual period of spring plowing and planting. The spring rains began, however, on September 15 and have

been general throughout the country, thus relieving what promised to be a most serious situation.

"Good rains have benefited crops in Uruguay and a wheat crop of about one-third more than last year is now expected. Weather conditions continue favorable in Australia and considering the increase in acreage and the favorable growing conditions a large crop is expected. Good rains are also reported from South Africa over the bulk of the wheat-growing area.

Threshing of the grain crop for 1921 is now practically completed. Rain is now interfering somewhat with threshing in some sections of Canada and a slight reduction both in quantity and quality of the wheat crop may result. Harvesting and threshing were generally carried on under favorable conditions in the United States and also in eastern, southern and central Europe. According to estimates now available the total wheat production of the 29 leading wheat-producing countries of the

world (excluding Russia) was 2,552,825,000 bushels in 1921, compared with 2,651,950,000 bushels in 1920, an increase of 190,865,000 bushels.

The condition of crops in China is generally reported to be disappointing. Excessive rains in the early part of the growing season, succeeded by a long continued drought, caused much damage. As no statistics are available it is impossible to state the amount of damage done, but the general belief is that crops are below average. The wheat crop in the Yangtze Valley has proved about 60 per cent of the normal and 20 per cent below that of 1920. In Shantung and Chihle the crop is again very poor and almost as bad as last year's production when the great famine occurred. The crops in southern Manchuria are reported to be abundant excepting part of the Liao Valley. In general crops are expected to yield about 20 per cent above average. The condition is not so favorable in northern Manchuria and the

continued drought in the Hunan district has nearly killed the bean and Italian millet crops. The wheat crop for northern Manchuria is expected to be about 20 per cent below average.
