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WORLD PAYS TRIBUTE TO ALL THE DEAD

Tens of Thousands Streaming through Capitol Rotunda

GREAT AND SMALL FOLK IN PROCESSION

Mountains of Flowers From All States, Europe and Far Away Africa Already Arrived.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Great and small folk moved in an endless procession today through the rotunda of the capitol to pay tribute to the unknown dead lying in such state as only martyred presidents have known. Hour by hour the heaping flowers about the casket grew mountain high and spread about the vast chamber. Flowers that bloomed in France were there. And flowers brought by representatives of the government states and organizations and flowers brought in all their beauty from South Africa, 9,000 miles away. King George sent a wreath. There are no organizations of veterans or patriotic people who were not represented.

KAMELA GRADE IN GOOD SHAPE ALL THE WAY

County Judge Spent Yesterday Inspecting Road and Is Well Pleased With It.

County Judge E. G. Couch yesterday inspected the new grade from Kamela to La Grande, which includes the new mountain road created by the state and county and over which traffic will be diverted next year. Mr. Couch, accompanied by A. W. Nelson, manager of the Ad Club, and A. Edwin Pryke, drove to Kamela over the old grade and returned over the new. Incidentally, it is reported by the party that the old, historic grade is in good shape and no one need complain, for there is nothing rough or muddy about it.

Leaving Kamela, the grade follows the railroad track down the mountain side for a distance of about two miles, and then, by overhead at Gibson, crosses to the south side of the track, and leaves the O-W right of way, skirting south, and coming to the Grande Ronde river at the Hawas bridge, near the West ranch. Winding down the canyon with graceful curves, the men on the trip report, the new highway is a thing of majestic beauty. The 16-foot roadway has nothing steeper than 5 per cent anywhere. Where the road crosses Dry Creek, to reach the proposed overhead, William Kelley of La Grande is now building a concrete bridge. Immediately below that point, the approach to the overhead has been built but the structure has not been commenced.

Detour Necessary
A bad detour is necessary at that point at the present time, and Judge Couch put his car through some places that came near sending the machine to the hospital. Because of this short detour it is wholly impractical, and quite dangerous in fact, to attempt to go over the grade at this time. As soon as a satisfactory detour is provided, early summer traffic will no doubt go that way. Most of the distance the cuts and grades are on the south side of the slopes so that snow will not remain long in the spring. Penetrating, as it does, entirely virgin territory, the novelty of the first trip over it is a pleasant one. Dropping out of the canyon down to the river, the grade first is high in the air, gliding down to the old Starkey roadhead with easy pitch.

Graveling on this piece of road will commence early in the year and while the overhead already mentioned may not be built until late next summer, the construction of the one detour will make the new grade useable. The distance from Kamela to the river at Hawas bridge, near

BUSINESS WILL HALT ALL DAY TO HONOR VETS

Two-minute Silent Prayer at Noon to Usher in Day's Services in Honor of War Heroes

La Grande's business will halt all day tomorrow in honor of the men who defended the country in the worst crisis of its history, the World War. All business houses have announced that they will close, grocers and other purveyors of necessities having been busy this morning notifying their patrons that they will not be open. The freight office of the O-W. R. R. & N will also be closed, according to announcement by J. J. Keeney, local agent, while the Western Union office will observe Sunday hours.

Although the day is to be an all-day holiday, the program will not begin until afternoon. At noon, instead of the regular three strokes of the fire bell only two strokes will be sounded. At the request of President Harding, two minutes at noon will be devoted to silent prayer throughout the United States and La Grande people will at that time join the hundreds of millions of Americans in other parts of the country in observing the two-minute meditation.

At one o'clock the big patriotic parade will begin to move from the corner of Elm and Washington. In the line-up will be patriotic organizations representing the veterans of three wars. The G. A. R. members and women of the W. R. F. will be given the honor of leading the veterans in the parade. The Spanish-American war veterans will be in line and the veterans of the World War. All former service men, whether they served in the American army or in the armies of the allied nations, are asked to take part in the parade, in uniform, if possible. While the American Legion post is responsible for the arrangements for the day, every service man should be in the parade, the committee in charge announces. Field star mothers are especially requested to be on hand, transportation being furnished by the Legion to all gold star mothers.

The parade will be followed by a program at the E. D. St. Ignace at which Col. F. S. Ivanhoe will be the principal speaker.

In the afternoon a football game will be played at the high school.

AGAIN MAKE AN EFFORT TO CO-OPERATE

Farmers of Country Meet Today in Chicago on Marketing

LIVESTOCK MEN TO PRESENT PLAN

No Pool Covering Period of Years as was the Case With the Grain Growers' Plan.

CHICAGO, Nov. 10.—For the second time this year farmers of the country meet today to consider launching of a national co-operative marketing movement. This time it is of livestock. After working nine months a farmers' livestock committee of 15 named by the American Farm Bureau Federation brings in its report today to a ratification conference representative of livestock producers.

Unlike the national grain marketing plan adopted last spring and incorporated in the U. S. Grain Growers' Inc., the livestock plan called for no pool nor contract covering a period of years.

Establishment of a national livestock-producers' association is one of the outstanding features of the program laid before today's meeting. More important yet, as the heart of the plan, is the creation of co-operative livestock commission associations at the various stockyards, with allied stocker-and-feeder companies.

Co-operative livestock commission companies, which have recently grown numerous, are to be strengthened. A program of orderly marketing is to be worked out. A transportation department is to be created. Livestock statistics are to be interpreted. In addition it is advancing public appreciation of meat as a food.

What the plan proposes to do, in short, is to greatly extend the co-operative marketing of livestock from the farmer to the packing house, to do this through a national organization overseeing, dovetailing and working out plans, and to eventually regulate to a considerable degree the flow of livestock to the markets so as to prevent glut and disastrous price-breaks.

What is expected for the farmer is a larger voice in the sale of his livestock, a saving in marketing costs, a saving in purchase and sale of stock.

NEW CONTRACT FOR LIGHTS TO BE MADE NOW

Ornamental Lighting For Down Town Will Not be Installed; Survey to be Made.

At the meeting of the city commission last evening it was agreed to enter into a contract with the East Oregon Light & Power company for a period of five years on the same terms as the contract expiring November 16. This decision was reached after discussing the lighting situation from several angles.

J. P. Lottridge, manager of the light company, appeared before the commission and submitted two propositions to that body. One provided for renewing the present contract and the other for replacing the present installation on Adams avenue with ornamental standards.

Mr. Lottridge pointed out to the commission that in renewing the contract the company is not asking an increase in spite of the heavy increase in materials and other costs, entering into the corporation expenses during the past five years. The company agrees under the terms of the contract to be entered into, in addition to the terms of the old contract, to make a survey of the lighting situation of the city at its own expense. It will then make recommendations for the reasonable and "feasible" redistribution of the existing lights of the city.

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RATE REVISION MAY BE RESULT

Many Products Of Valley Win

Horses, Apples and Corn of County Among Best in West Shown at International Exposition.

The Grande Ronde valley as a purebred stock raising country is again coming into its own at the annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition. There are many exhibits at Portland from the valley and among these the heavy draft team owned by W. R. Ledbetter and Floyd McKennon which took second prize in the heavy draft teams shown with wagons at the horse show in connection with the exposition.

The complete list of prize winners will reveal many more from the Grande Ronde valley. Besides the big event in the form of the stock show there are other products on display. A land products show is being held as a part of the exposition. In the Rome Beauty apple class Scott Harms of F. pin took second place, showing "diversity is the valley's watchword in farming."

Corn is another product that can be raised better in the valley than in some other places, judging from the prizes awarded at the corn exhibits. While nearly all the corn in the valley is made into silage William A. Anson took 100 ears of White Dent that he allowed to ripen for the show and in its class it took first place.

Hearing to be Held in City Hall on November Eighteenth

The state public service commission has filed with the city commission an application for a change in rates demanded by the Home Independent Telephone company and a hearing is to be held in the city hall at ten o'clock on the morning of Friday, November 18.

The application filed with the city was read at last night's meeting and commissioners as well as other officials present, expressed themselves as being against such an increase. The increase demanded would raise the rate on one-party lines from \$2.75 per month to \$3 per month, on two-party lines from \$2.25 to \$2.50 per month and on four-party lines from \$1.75 to \$2.25 per month, double the amount of increase asked for the other forms of service.

"In view of the kind of service we are getting now, any price is too high," declared President W. D. Grandy. "We are practically without service now, especially on the rural lines."

Commissioner David I. Stoddard sounded a sympathetic note among the commissioners and other officials present when he declared that the company should give service before asking for any increase and added that La Grande has the worst service of any town he is acquainted with.

City Attorney James D. Slater expressed the opinion that the increase asked was too steep.

The matter was referred to the city attorney with instructions to represent the city at the hearing next week.

DISARMAMENT CONFERENCE OF STUDENTS

CHICAGO, NOV. 10.—A disarmament conference, at which student delegates from seven religious colleges in the United States will meet here on November 13th and 14th has been arranged by Dr. A. W. Harris of New York, secretary of the Board of Education of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The meeting is called by the boards of Education of the Protestant churches, in cooperation with the council of church boards of Education, the bureau of education of the Catholic hierarchy, the educational section of the conference of American Bishops, the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A. The opening session will be held on Sunday evening and will be inspirational.

Dr. Harris in calling the meeting for disarmament says: "To youth of the land now in college and high school the significance of President Harding's attempt may be vastly greater than to any men of middle age or old age. To these younger men it means a vast change in mechanical and financial conditions and it may mean the sacrifice of life in military service of multitudes of young men now in the schools, or of their children."

"No part of the community has a better right to speak than those who carry the burdens and meet the troubles of the future."

PROPOSAL TO LIMIT NAVY IS PREPARED

America Only Nation to Present Definite Proposition

OTHER NATIONS LOOK TO U. S. FOR PLAN

Nothing Visionary About Secretary Hughes' Ideas is Announcement Made.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The proposals to be made by the American delegation to the conference on limitation of armaments constitute apparently the only suggestion prepared in advance as to the ways and means of curtailing the naval expenditures without the sacrifice by any power of its national security.

Great Britain is known not to have worked out any formula and Japan is awaiting America's suggestion. France and Italy are more concerned with land forces than navies.

The American proposals remain carefully guarded and secret but it is known that a formula for limitation of naval forces had been derived by Secretary Hughes and his colleagues. It is entirely practicable and does not attempt to fix the common denominator by which all navies could be divided and each power assigned a number of units it could maintain. The American proposal will deal with things as they are.

TWO TRAINS IN SOUTH WRECKED THIS MORNING

One Trainman is Missing and Eight Passengers are Reported to be Badly Hurt.

MARSHALL, Texas, Nov. 10.—One trainman is reported missing and several passengers were slightly injured in a head-on collision early today of a westbound Texas and Pacific passenger train and an eastbound freight train, seven miles east of Longview. The passenger train was derailed and the baggage car smashed and the wreckage burned.

MULHALL, Okla., Nov. 10.—Six were seriously injured and a number of others bruised and cut when three Pullmans and the day coaches of a southbound Santa Fe passenger train were derailed on an embankment one mile south of here early today.

PORK DROPPING

PORTLAND, Nov. 10.—Cattle were steady and hogs 25 cents lower today. Prime lights being \$8.85 to \$8.75. Sheep, eggs and butter were steady.

NEARLY ALL OF DELEGATES ARE IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—Arthur J. Balfour, acting head of the British delegation to the armament conference arrived here today. The New Zealand delegation and the Australian delegates also arrived. This completes, with the exception of Lloyd George, who promised to come later the British representation. The conference body is now a completed unit with the exception of Deputy Meda of Italy, detained at Rome, and the Portuguese representatives who are expected tomorrow.
