RED MITES INJURIOUS.

Red mites are blood-sucking insects that live in the houses, in the cracks about the nests, droppings, boards, and perches during the day and crawl onto the bodies of the birds at night, doing serious injury. Red mites lower vitality, produce anaemia, lower egg production and greatly annoy the birds. They can be easily gotten rid of by painting the infested places in the house with gas tar, diluted with equal parts with kerosene, or by carbolineum, or one of many good commercial peach paints. It should be kept in mind that the place to fight the mites is the house and not the birds themselves.

HARDING PLEADS FOR DISARMING

Invitation Sent to Nations Taking Part in Conference Asks for Smaller Navy.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—President Harding's invitation to the nations to a discussion of a limitation of armaments follows:

"The president is deeply gratified at the cordial response to his suggestion that there should be a conference on the subject of limitation of armaments in part follows:

"Productive labor is staggering under an economic burden too heavy to be borne unless the present vast public expenditures are greatly reduced. It is idle to look for stability, or the assurance of social justice, or the security of peace, while wasteful and unproductive outlays deprive effort of its just reward and defeat the reasonable expectation of progress. The enormous, disbursements in the rivalries of armaments manifestly constitute the greater part of the encumbrance upon the enterprise and national prosperity; and available or extravagant expense of this nature is not only without economic justification but is a constant menace to the peace of the world rather than an assurance of its preservation. Yet there would seem to be no ground to expect the halting of these increasing outlays unless the powers most largely concerned find satisfactory basis for an agreement to effect their limitation. The time is believed to be opportune for these powers to approach this subject directly and in conference; and while in the discussion of limitation of armaments, the question of naval armament may naturally have first place, it has been thought best not to exclude questions pertaining to other armaments to the end that all practicable measures of relief may have appropriate consideration. It may also be found advisable to formulate proposals by which in the interest of humanity the use of new agencies of warfare may be suitably controlled.

"It is, however, quite clear that there can be no final assurance of the peace of the world in the absence of the desire for peace, and the prospect of reduced armaments is not a hopeful one unless this desire finds expression in a practical effort to remove causes of misunderstanding and to seek ground for agreement as to principles and their application. It is the earnest wish of this government that through an interchange of views with the facilities afforded by a conference, it may be possible to find a solution of Pacific and Far Eastern problems, of unquestionable importance at this time, that is, such common understandings with respect to matters which have been and are of international concern as may serve to promote enduring friendship among our peoples.

"It is not the purpose of this government to attempt to define the scope of the discussion in relation to the Pacific and Far East but rather to leave this to be the subject of exchange before the meeting of the conference, in the expectation that the spirit of friendship and a cordial appreciation of the importance of the elimination of sources of controversy will govern the final decision."

MEMORIAL HALL DEDICATION

D. A. R. Will Hold Impressive Ceremonies on November 17 in Washington.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—Memorial Continental Hall, the white marble home of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution, where the general sessions of the Arms conference will be held is dedicated to the patriots who achieved American independence. It is situated west of the President's park, on Seventeenth street on the site of a residence of James Madison.

Designed by Edward Pearce Casey of New York, the erection of the structure was undertaken by the Daughters in April 1904 at a cost of \$700,000. It is built of Vermont marble and in design and general appearance resembles the classical buildings erected during the American Revolutionary period. It is a fit fellow of its neighboring structures the Pan-American and Red Cross buildings. The front portico, the outer columns of which are adjacent to the sidewalk on Seventeenth street, provides for a carriage drive and leaves the visitor at the entrance steps, where three bronze memorial doors give access into the reception hall.

Within the entire building the note of the Continental period is carried out with colonial decorations and furniture, and many excellent "pieces" of mahogany bring forth thoughts of the cherished heirlooms in grandfathers' houses. Many of the rooms and portions of the building are the gifts of or were furnished by individual chapters of the National society.

For example, the spacious entrance hall is the gift of the Pennsylvania chapters. In niches, forming the freize, are marble statues of Revolutionary heroes from several states. A north and south staircases, both memorial gifts, lead above to the galleries and committee rooms.

Opening directly from the vestibule is the auditorium, which with its three galleries, has a seating capacity of two thousand people. For the Arms conference, however, the seats on the ground floor have been removed and the floor raised to the level of the platform on the west side of the hall. Here will be set up the "U" shaped council table, measuring over 100 feet around its three sides, where the delegates to the conference will sit. Visitors and representatives of the press will be seated in the gallery.

The auditorium is a beautiful inspiring room with cream-tinted walls, decorated with the garlands of fruit and foliage, and fitted with mahogany furnishings. High above is a roof of ground-glass, divided into ornamental squares. Each state of the union is represented by a flag hanging from the cornice. Set in the east gallery railing is an illuminated clock bearing the arms of Maryland and the insignia of the society. In the galleries to the north and south hang oil paintings of Washington at Dorchester Heights by Darius Cobb, and Martha Washington, by Prof. E. F. Andrews, both to the society. On either side of the stage-like platform two boxes are raised slightly above the level of the floor and set within the proscenium arch, affording an excellent view of the proceedings on floor.

Other finely furnished rooms on the first floor serve as offices for the national officers, a library and a museum where are exhibited treasures of great historic value, among them John Hancock's desk.

On the south side of the building overlooking the Pan American grounds, projects a semi-circular portico, the roof of which is supported by 12 monolithic marble columns presented by the 13 original states.

On the second floor are the offices of President General, and a reception room furnished with chairs and desks of the colonial period and historical oil paintings. A spacious room is reserved for the meetings of the national board; it is known as the Connecticut room. Among the furnishings are 13 curved chairs bearing on their high backs the coats of arms of the 13 original states.

The window draperies are of blue satin embroidered in gold, and the lace curtains are woven in a star and stripe design.

Other offices and rooms on the second floor include the recording and corresponding secretaries' rooms, the Massachusetts room furnished like an old colonial parlor with authentic furniture, the California and Michigan rooms and the committee room furnished by the Daughters of State of New Jersey, paneled and furnished in wood from the old British Frigate Augusta. This room and the national board room are available as committee rooms for the Arms delegates.

On the third floor there is a private dining room prepared by Virginia, several small committee rooms and a lounge with bookshelves in the decorative design the upper of the society.
