

## WALLOWA HONORS ITS WAR HEROES

Patriotic Exercises Held Friday; all Business Houses Were Closed.

WALLOWA, Ore., Nov. 15.—Armistice Day was celebrated in Wallowa yesterday. All of the business houses were closed and flags and bunting were seen in various places. Perhaps the most unique decoration was in connection with the football game of the afternoon, in the window of Banda Variety store. The display was made of black and yellow candles, the black candles in the word Wallowa and the yellow the word Wins, thus showing the slogan "Wallowa Wins."

The gym was beautifully decorated with flags, bunting and potted plants and flowers. At the back of the stage a large national flag was hung straight down in all its beauty and simplicity. Such was the setting for the program which began about one o'clock with the singing of "America" by the audience, followed by the invocation by Rev. Mr. Fosse of the M. E. church.

Prof. D. R. White acted as chairman and made a few explanations relative to the Ceremonial of the Flag which was the next number.

Mrs. D. R. White, dressed in pure white, represented the Spirit of the Flag and stated so in a brief recitation. At the words of the first verse of "John Brown's Body," sung behind the scenes, James A. Tulley, veteran of the Civil war, stepped forward and placed a red scarf over the left shoulder of the Spirit; "Tenting Tonight" and J. M. Bledsoe, veteran of the Spanish war, placed a blue scarf over the right shoulder; "The Americans Come" sung by Miss Frederieke Schilke and Samuel T. Ballie, veteran of the World war, placed a starry crown upon her head. Each act was noticed by a verse from the spirit. The whole ceremony was well executed and Miss Schilke should be given credit for the success of this number. In the singing she was assisted by the glee clubs of the school.

The male quartet, consisting of Messrs. White, Tulley, Vaught and McKenzie, gave two numbers.

Prof. White then introduced the speaker of the day, Hon. Walter Pierce of La Grande, the author of the soldiers' and sailors' educational bill.

## NEAR EAST WORK NOT FINISHED

Americans Should Continue Their Work Says Frank Vanderlip of New York

CONSTANTINOPLE, Nov. 15.—Americans should continue their humanitarian work in the Near East, said Frank A. Vanderlip, New York financier, when he visited this city in the course of an economic survey of Europe.

"We may be charged with shirking our political responsibilities in the Near East and with desertion of our associates in the late war when they came here to administer an exceedingly awkward and difficult situation," he continued. "But there is nothing but praise for America for her wonderful relief work here."

Mr. Vanderlip said Americans had signally distinguished themselves in their work in behalf of the 500,000 Russian, Armenian and Turkish refugees who fled to Constantinople. He continued:

"The American Red Cross has furnished these unfortunate refugees with \$10,000,000 in supplies and transportation. They have been the chief instrument in moving refugees to where they could have an economic life. Their work has just ceased. There are still tens of thousands of refugees. There are 15,000 utterly without means of support."

"Every American here feels the Red Cross work should be continued for a short time until these remaining refugees are able to secure subsistence for themselves."

The American banker closed the interview with a warm commendation of the activities of the other American relief organizations and educational bodies in Constantinople and a plea that the people at home would continue to support their work.

"The Near East Relief Committee," he said, "is feeding more than 50,000 children in Asia Minor and the Caucasus. The Y. M. C. A. and the Y. W. C. A. are doing a great, efficient and noble work. The Menonites have made a splendid contribution to assuage misery. The International Christian Students' Relief is doing one of the most valuable tasks of all. It is of vast importance for the future of Europe that the torch of higher learning shall be passed on."

"There is a passion in this part of the world for education; the means are pitifully lacking. No contributions are better placed than those for student relief. The influence of the old American colleges here for good is beyond measure."

"All these efforts to help humanity in a pitiful plight, but still a humanity that is tremendously worth

helping, give America a unique prestige. I believe we should go on with our efforts and continue to deserve that prestige."

"America is the hope of the world, and nowhere more so than in this part of the world. Let us redeem that hope and bring it to a living realization among those needy and distracted people of the Near East. Let us carry on."

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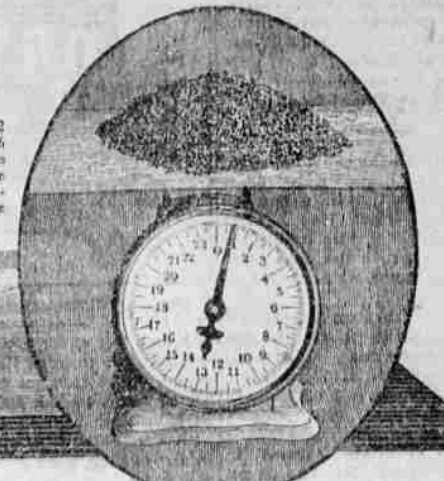
